BOY INJURED WHEN AUTO HITS BICYCLE

Highland Park Lad Suffers Leg Fracture; Car Driven by Lake Forest Girl

Allan Benson, aged eight and one-half years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Astor Benson of Highland Park suffered fracture of both bones of the right leg below the knee and a cut on the head, Monday afternoon, when he was struck by an automobile, while riding a bicycle in South St. John's avenue in front of his home. The automobile it was reported, was driven by Miss Lucy Speidel of Lake Forest, and it is reported to have been moving at not over 20 miles an hour when the accident happened, as the driver had noticed the erratic riding of the boy. The accident is accounted for by the fact that the bicycle ridden by the lad was a borrowed one and too large for him. The handle bar of the wheel struck and broke a headlight of the car. The condition of the boy is reported to be as good as could be expected under the circumstances.
