### ILLINOIS BOYS TO REPRESENT AMERICA

Three Whiteside County Lads to Go to International Stock Judging

Three Whiteside county farm boys will sail for Europe June 7 to represent America in an international stock judging contest to be held in England under the auspices of the London Daily Mail. The three, Edwin Folkers, and Donald Williams of Sterling, and Harold Gaurapp of Rock Falls, all 17 and 18 years old, compose the junior championship judging team of America.

All expenses of the trip are to be paid by dairy manufacturers, breeders, individuals and other interested concerns. L. O. Wise, Whiteside county farm advisor, and C. S. Rhode, dairy extension specialist of the University of Illinois, will accompany them.

Plans are being made to have the boys stop at Washington to give a demonstration of cattle judging before the President and his cabinet on the White House lawn.

In England the team will compete with teams from a number of other countries for a gold cup. After the contest, they will tour Europe, returning about August 1. The Whiteside county boys won the trip by defeating 20 other teams in the Junior judging contest at the National Dairy show last October. They had previously won the right to represent Illinois in the national contest by winning the state championship at the Aurora fair last fall.

### NEW GOLF COURSE IN COUNTY, PLAN

Chicago Man Buys Tract of Land West of Waukegan; Believed for Club

Lake county is to have a new golf course, located three miles west of Waukegan and covering 200 acres of ground. A 40 acre tract of land adjacent to the proposed golf course is to be subdivided and sold strictly for residential purposes.

The golf course and subdivision will be on the land known as the Joseph Harry Gould farm, according to Waukegan reports, which say a deal was closed last week for the sale of the land. The consideration is reported to be \$78,000.

### BRING HOME REMAINS OF VOLCANO VICTIM

Body of Libertyville Man Who Was Killed in Hawaii on Way to U. S.

Coroner John L. Taylor, Libertyville, has received a cablegram from Hawaii, where his nephew, Truman S. Taylor, a former Libertyville resident, was killed in a violent volcano explosion stating the remains would be shipped to Libertyville. The body is expected to arrive in Libertyville about June 5.

Taylor, who was a bookkeeper at Pahala, met his death in an explosion in the crater of Kilauea volcano on the island of Hawaii. He was struck by a rock which fell some 1,800 feet from the crater.
