PRESIDENT URGES OUTDOOR EXERCISE

Active Play In Open Air Much Needed in Our National Life He Says

Stressing the need for a revival of the play spirit in America, President Coolidge opened the first national conference on outdoor recreation, called to devise methods of systematically developing nation-wide recreation and physical development.

Advance of civilization, the president warned, is taking the people further and further away from the active outdoor life which is so essential to the welfare of a nation.

"Our country is a land of cultured men and women," Mr. Coolidge said. "Side by side with the industrial plants should be the gymnasium, and the athletic field. Along with the learning of a trade by which a livelihood is to be earned should go the learning of how to participate in the activities of recreation.

"The country needs instruction in order that we may better secure these results.

"Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the efforts to get the children out of the alleys and off the streets into spacious open places where there is good sunlight and plenty of fresh air. An opportunity has both a physical and mental effect. It restores the natural balance of life and nourishes the moral fibre of youth."

The president explained that in calling the conference there had been no idea of federal domination of athletic activities.

CANADA MAY BAR RACING OF HORSES

Bill in Parliament Would Prohibit Sport and Printing of Results

The life of horse-racing in Canada was threatened last week when an anti-racing bill came up for consideration in parliament.

The bill, which, with a sister measure, would stop gambling on races, wipe out handbooks by prison sentences and forbid Canadian newspapers from publishing race track information, must be passed by both houses of commons and the senate. It provides also that American newspapers carrying racing entries and betting odds, would be refused entry into the dominion.
