while the operatic twins, "Cavalleria Rusticana" and "Pagliacci," hardly classify as what you might call novelties, they are about the most popular of the 27,000 or so lyric works that have been put to paper since Monteverde started the habit with "Orfeo."

As for the casts, you will travel quite a distance and examine a good many program books before you will find a list that will beat them, or even tie them.

The Participants

Mascagni's slice of operatic life in Sicily will be made manifest by no less than Florence Easton, Merle Alcock, Giacomo Lauri-Volpi, and Vicente Ballester; and Leoncavallo's specimen of verismo will have Lucrezia Bori, Giovanni Martinelli, Giuseppe Danise, and Desire Defrere as its interpreters, Gennaro Papi will wave a potent baton over both performances. It will be Mme. Bori's first appearance in this section of these United States, which, to those who desire to keep in touch with musical happenings, is something.

Mrs. Alcock and Mr. Martinelli are known hereabouts for their accomplishments in concert and not opera, but these have been of such a kind that one does not need to peruse press clippings from Broadway to be fairly certain of being rewarded for attending.
