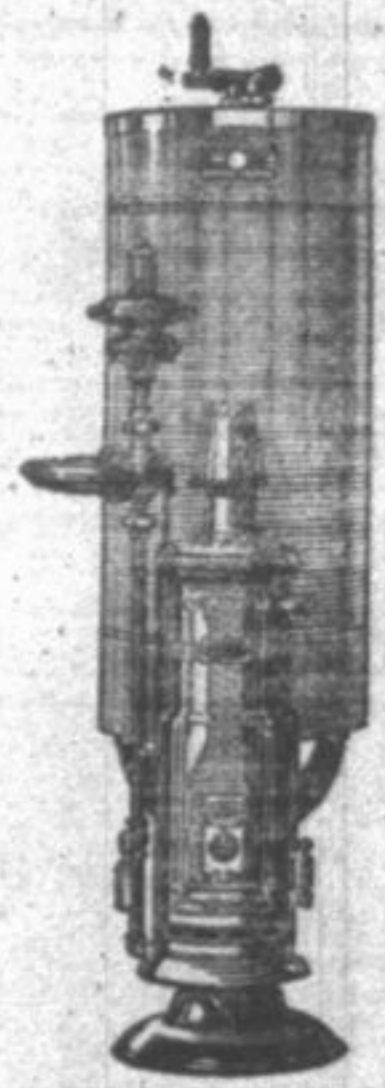

MANY RECEIVE PRIZES AT FIRST FLOWER SHOW

Deerfield Garden Club Exhibits at Jordan Farm; Plan Another Later

More flowers were exhibited in the first flower show given by the Garden club of Deerfield last week at Arden farm, the home of Mrs. E. B. Jordan, than the committee expected to show.

Many varieties, not classified under the four groups for which premiums were to be awarded were brought, and were of such unusual perfection that ribbons were pinned upon the displays.

From the beautiful gardens of A. R. Warner, her pink peonies received a blue ribbon, and Mrs. J. A. Reichelt's, Jr.'s huge white ones, a red ribbon for the most perfect blooms. Mrs. Franc Hemstead's iris was awarded a blue ribbon for perfection, and a red one for artistic arrangement, and Mrs. Jesse Raymond Jones, of the Margaret Vedder farm, was given second prize for the same two reasons.

Roses were scarce on account of the lateness of the season, so that only three vases of them were displayed. Mrs. W. W. Clark, Jr., received a blue ribbon and Mrs. G. D. Richards a red one for their roses.

For the most artistic arrangement of peonies Mrs. E. B. Jordan and Mrs. Clark received prizes.

Gorgeous oriental poppies sent by Mrs. Jesse Jones, digitals and delphinium by Mrs. Warner were awarded ribbons.

Luscious strawberries grown by Mrs. R. B. Patterson were decorated with a blue ribbon, and peonies growing in Mrs. Jordan's garden were marked with first prize emblem. Mrs. Hummel's pansies received honorable mention.

For the most artistic baskets of mixed flowers Mrs. Lincoln Pettis received a first award for a combination of double buttercups, syringa, bleeding hearts, gaillardia, pyrethrum, two varieties of daisies and one pink peony.

The red ribbon was given Mrs. Clark's basket of daisies, garden pinks and heliotrope, bachelor button, baby's breath, gypsophila and a red rose.

Honorable mention was given Mrs. Metcalf's basket of iris, cinnamon roses, peonies and spirea.

Mrs. James Hood also received honorable mention for her peonies.

Mr. Franken and Mr. Kotrasch, the Deerfield florists, generously sent large consignments of flowers. The potted plants were sold, the proceeds going to the Garden club's treasury. The cut flowers were all taken to the Children's Memorial hospital, Chicago, by Dr. Davis.

The judges were Mrs. Arthur Brown, of Highland Park, Miss Winifred Nichol, of Wilmette (a teacher in the Lincoln school Highland Park) and Mrs. C. C. Brachett, Wilmet road, Deerfield.

A flower and vegetable show will be given by the Garden club in September.

The next meeting in July will be an inspection of gardens. Mrs. Guy Houghton Newcomb is president of the club.

DIRECT TELEPHONE WIRE TO DEERFIELD

Express Method Installed And Is Great Convenience; How To Call

To quicken the telephone service between Highland Park and Deerfield the Telephone company recently installed the express method between these two points, and the added convenience is greatly appreciated by the people of both towns. The improvement has been effected at large expense by the company, but it believes in giving service and the direct wire to Deerfield is certainly a great accommodation; as heretofore it was necessary to go by long distance through Chicago to get Deerfield.

When you call Deerfield from here or Highland Park from there and are willing to speak to anyone who answers, place the call exactly as a local call and remain with receiver to the ear until the call is completed. If, however, you desire to speak to a particular individual, or make an appointment call long distance, as before.

FEDERAL TAX OFF TELEPHONE CALLS

Removed After Midnight July 2 And An Increased Use of Wires Expected

"After midnight on Wednesday, July 2nd, and toll on long distance telephone messages are free from the federal tax, which has been in effect since April 1, 1919," states Commercial Manager Judd this morning, in an announcement issued July 1.

"This tax of 5 cents on each message of from 15 to 50 cents, and 10 cents on each message of over 50 cents, added materially to the cost of telephoning, especially on toll messages over moderate distances," said Manager Judd, "and its removal will permit more liberal use of the service without adding to the cost."

Mr. Judd stated that the Telephone company, anticipating an increased use of the toll service, particularly to nearby points, has provided additional equipment and personnel to meet the demand.

RATHBONE TO RADIO ADDRESS ON LINCOLN

Congressman at Large to Broadcast Talk From KYW On July 9, Evening

Congressman-at-Large Henry R. Rathbone of Illinois, is to deliver part of his celebrated address on Abraham Lincoln, on Wednesday evening, July 9, at 8:15 p. m., over KYW, Chicago.

Congressman Rathbone is well known to the people of this community, having met many of them personally and having spoken on a number of occasions in the county.

This address was originally delivered by Congressman Rathbone on Feb. 12, 1924, before the house of representatives, and a distinguished audience in the gallery. It was an unusual honor conferred upon this new member to be chosen unanimously as the Lincoln's birthday orator of the house. Invitations to repeat this address have been pouring in from all over the country and Congressman Rathbone recently spoke on the same subject over the Washington radio. The following comment from the Washington Times of Feb. 12, 1924, accurately describes the manner in which his speech was received by congress:

"Abraham Lincoln was eulogized in the house this afternoon by Congressman Henry Rathbone of Illinois, whose parents sat in the presidential box at the old Ford's theater here on the night Lincoln was shot by Booth. "Prolonged applause followed the congressman's fifty-minute speech. Proceedings in the house were brought suddenly to a halt when practically the entire membership on the floor at the time rushed toward Rathbone with outstretched hands extending to him their congratulations on his talk."

"Probably no other man in congress was more qualified to eulogize Lincoln and his talk was therefore of more than usual interest."
