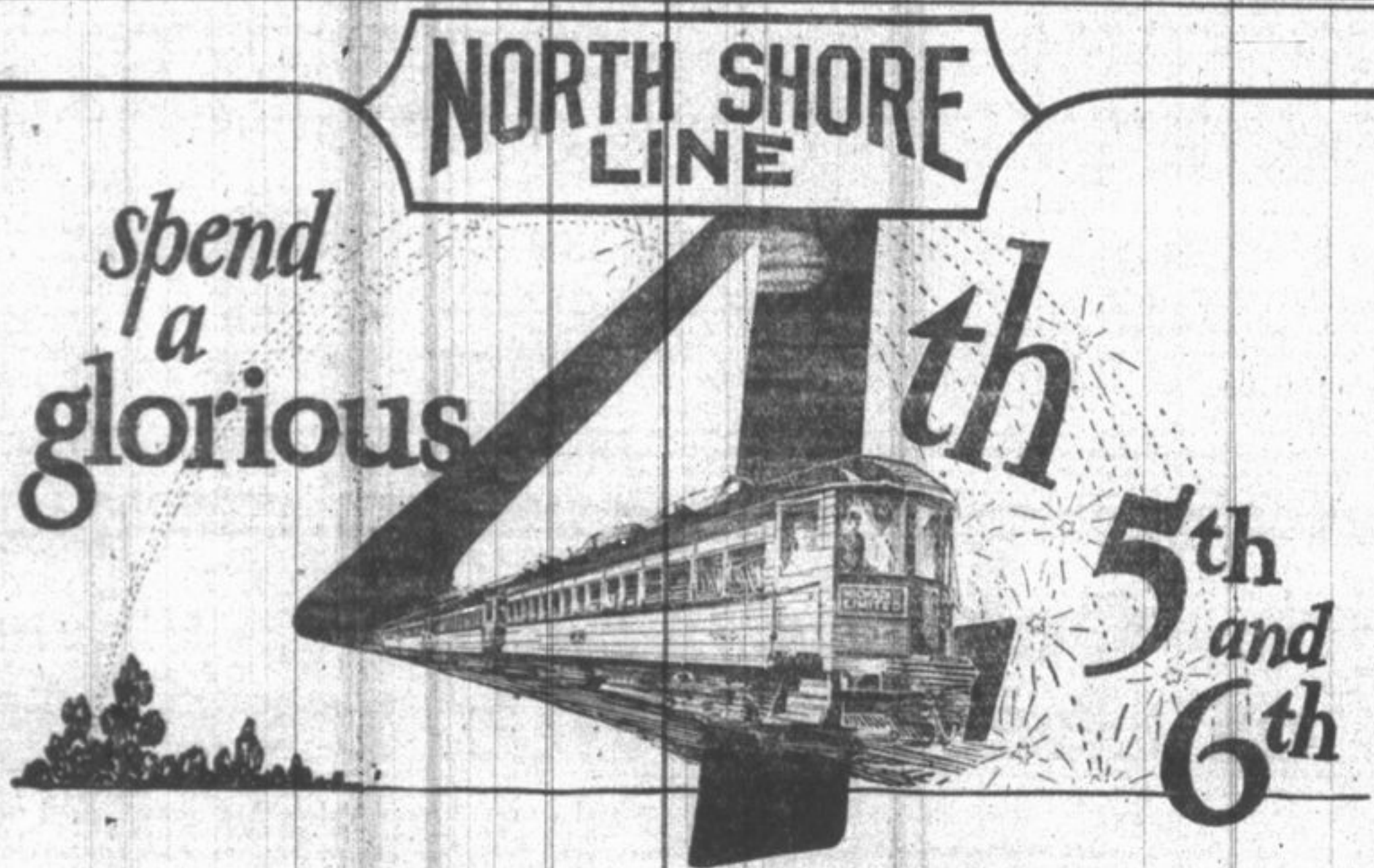

HARDING MEMORIAL AT VANCOUVER, CAN.

Great Organization of Which The Former President Was Member To Erect This Monument

A large granite and bronze memorial to the late President Harding is to be erected at Stanley Park, Vancouver, Canada, it was announced today at the annual international convention of The Kiwanis Club International. The late president was a charter member of The Kiwanis club of Marion, Ohio, when he was a senator.

This site for the Harding Memorial was chosen because it was the site where the late president made one of his last public addresses, and because of his expression in that address concerning the peace that exists between United States and Canada, and because of the membership of Kiwanis International which includes 1250 clubs in the United States and Canada.

The Memorial will be a semi circular granite seat, with the back higher in the center, and on this elevation in the center a bronze bas relief of the former president's profile will be placed, and an inscription which will contain an expression of his made on Canadian soil shortly before his death.

The appropriateness of the site is testified to by the intense interest of the Canadian Kiwanians as evidenced by the report of the Canadian Chairman of the International committee on public affairs, J. Walter C. Taylor, when he said that "what ever the memorial to the former president will be, we absolutely decline to be left out of it."

"From time to time," states the report of the Kiwanis International board of trustees, "Kiwanis International has had the pleasing privilege of being identified with activities which exemplify the continent-wide character of our organization and are prophetic of influences which will extend beyond the lives of those now living. We are the guardians of a chain of opportunities which links the future with a duty to posterity. Our obligation is not so much to ourselves as to our children and our children's children. That which will be perpetuated for future generations, therefore, appeals with special force to our spirit of service. It seems, then, a praise-worthy purpose to erect a shrine whereat present and future generations will dedicate themselves to a revival of patriotism and consecrate it to the memory of all our great and good men who swerved not from the rule of right and the law of duty that the blessings we enjoy might be our heirlooms today."

Deems It Privilege
"Because reverence at the shrines of the reverend dead never fails to thrill our hearts with emotions of idealism," said John H. Moss, of Milwaukee, in presenting the report. "I deem as a privilege accorded than as a duty assigned, the request of the International board of trustees to present to this convention their thought of having Kiwanis International erect, through voluntary subscriptions from among our membership, a memorial for the late President Warren G. Harding. Parenthetically may I say that the project may not be interpreted as possessing any political significance it is purposed to delay its consummation until after the time of the November national election."

"The thought is to erect as a memorial a semi-circular granite seat with the back higher in the center than at the ends, upon which elevation shall be placed a bronze bas relief of former President Harding's profile, an inscription below to contain one of his inspiring and significant utterances made on Canadian soil shortly before his demise. A combination of circumstances makes it especially appropriate to place such a monument in Stanley Park, Vancouver, Canada, one of the show-places of the North American continent which is annually visited by thousands of sight-seers from all parts of the world and was the place where President Harding delivered one of his last public addresses."

Referring, as the president did, in his Stanley Park address, to the amity existing between these two nations, adds significance to the placing of the memorial here. In that address President Harding said: "What an object lesson of peace is shown today by our two countries to all the world. Only a scrap of paper, recording hardly more than a simple understanding, safeguards lives and properties on the Great Lakes and only humble mile-posts mark the inviolable boundary line for thousands of miles through farms and forests. Our protection is in our fraternity, our armor is our faith and the tie that binds more firmly year by year is an ever-increasing acquaintance and comradeship through interchange of citizens. The compact is not of perishable parchment, but of fair and honorable dealings which, God grant, shall continue for all time."
