IMPORTS OF SILK SHOWING DECREASE

PRICE NOT MUCH CHANGED

Quarterly Report Indicates A Slowing up of Trade In This Material Over Last Year

Imports of raw silk during the first three months of this year amounted in value to \$77,312,000, or 8.1 per cent of our toal imports according to an analysis of American foreign trade for the first quarter of. 1924 just made public by the Foreign Commerce Department of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. A statement, by the department states that the "for he corresponding quarter of 1923 silk imports totaled \$101,657,000, or 9.9 per cent of our imports. The decrease in value was 24 per cent. The decline in quantity was also 24 per cent, 9,-877,000 pounds being imported dur-ing the first quarter of 1924 to 12,-999,000 pounds during the same period of 1923. The quantity imported year, however, was slightly greater than that brought in during the first quarter of 1922-9,353,000

Imports of broad silks were 42 per cent lower in value and 45 per cent in quantiy than for the January-March period of 1923, when 962,000 pounds, valued at \$5,888,000 were brought in, as compared with imports for the first quarter of this year totaling 525,000 pounds, valued

at \$3,442,000. "Our exports of broad silks also showed a loss. STATE LIBRARIES ARE NOW COMBINED

Emmerson as Illinois Librarian around. Builds Up Strong Organization

Illinois now has one of the best equipped state libraries in the country. Under the direction of Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson, who is the state librarian by virtue of his office, the state library and the state extension library have been brought together in a comprehensive organization which is proving very efficient. There are approximately 85,000 volumns in the general library and 30,-000 volumes in the library extension division, besides the large number of valuable documents and books in the archives division.

The state library was founded originally as a reference library for legislators and state officers. The scope of the collection has been enlarged as state government activities have increased and the library recourses have been made available not only to legislative and state officers, but through liberal inter-library loans to libraries and citizens throughout the state.

Library Extension The library extension commission was organized in 1909 for the purpose of extending and perfecting the public library system in Illinois, Its books were used for circulating pur-

By act of the legislature in 1921, the entire control of these libraries was brought under the secretary of state. The general library collection was established as a general library division and the extension library as the library extension division. these was added the archives division whose duty it is to collect and preserve important public documents.

All three branches of the library are located in the State Centennial building where commodious quarters have been fitted up for them.
