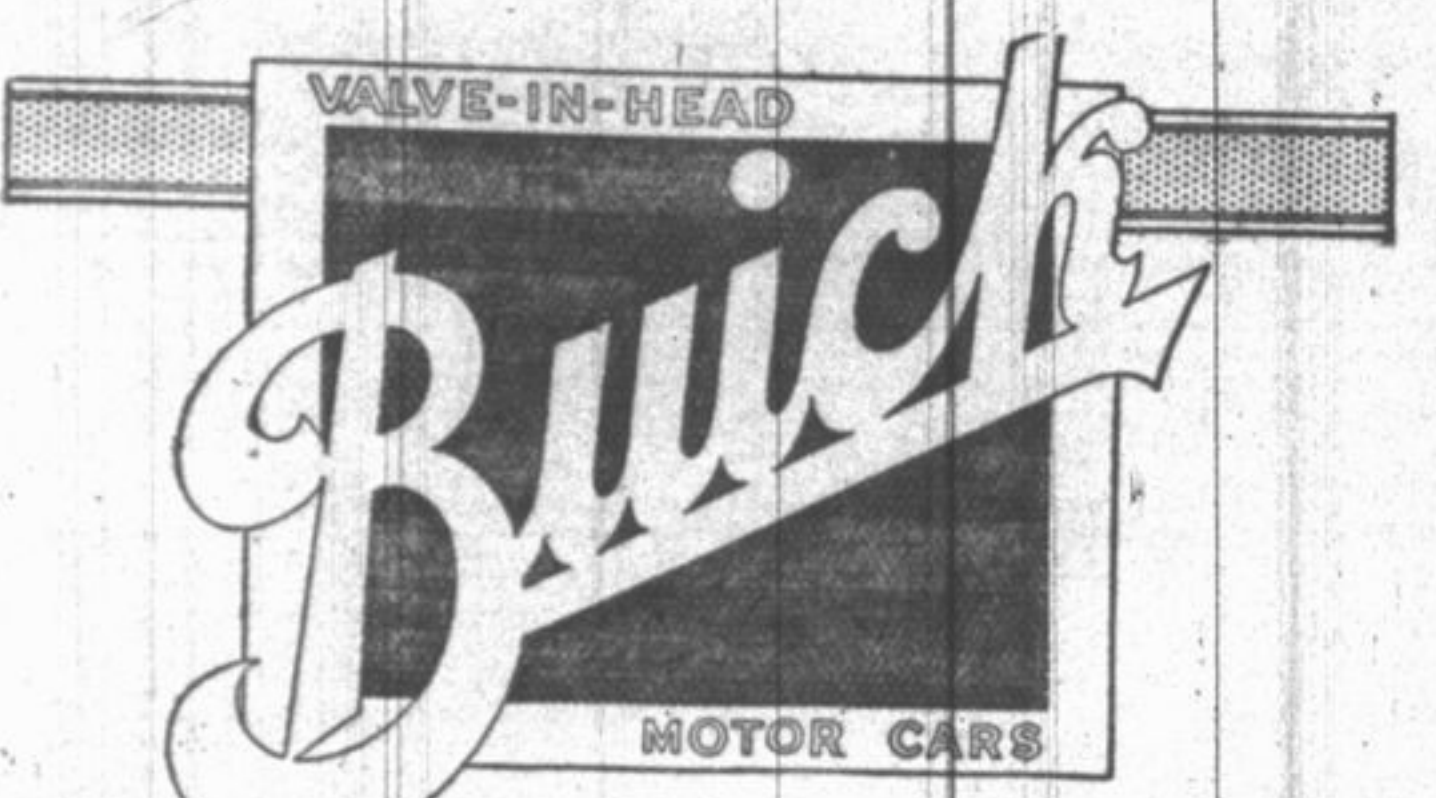

AMERICA IS LAND OF HAPPY HOMES
 MANY AIDS TO THIS END
 Numerous Associations Giving Assistance To Those Who Want To Build Own Residences

America is beyond all other countries the land of happy, pleasant homes—not apartments, not rented homes, not picturesque cottages, but real homes, owned by those who live in them, says Professor Ely, of the University of Wisconsin. Home building in this country has been greatly facilitated by building and loan associations, he believes. At the latest report, more than 10,000 local associations were in operation and their assets exceeded \$3,300,000,000. The associations are joined in a league, of which Miss Ann E. Rae is the president—a post in character with woman's importance as a home maker, says the Nation's Business.

Outstanding in the position of home building are the states of Pennsylvania, with association reporting assets of \$624,000,000 on January 1; and similarly, Ohio, with assets of \$564,000,000; New Jersey, \$360,000,000; Massachusetts, \$225,000,000; Illinois, \$200,000,000; and New York, \$155,000,000. Significant of the growth of building and loan associations throughout the country is the remarkable record of Niagara Falls, a city of 60,000 inhabitants. The Niagara Falls Permanent Savings and Loan Association, of which Miss Rae is also the president, now has assets of nearly \$8,000,000, and more than 12,000 members. For several years, so the record reads, there has been no foreclosure—and "no member has ever lost his home because of non-payment of dues."

To build more homes is to build a greater nation. In the home is the love of liberty nourished, and by home lovers has this country been protected in every national peril. No other shelter can quite take the place of the home. To establish its security men have willingly made the supreme sacrifice. A man will fight for his home. Whoever heard of any man fighting for his boarding house!

BRINGS STRANGE TALE FROM KANSAS
 Temperature 115 in Sun and in Daytime Everybody Carries Electric Fan

Many can remember when the Sunflower state inspired the song with the line, "And they eat potatoes raw—in Kansas." But now—well, read this from a recent issue of the Oak Leaves, the community weekly newspaper of Oak Park, Ill.

Major Bruce Bell returned on Thursday from a two weeks' vacation in Kansas. What a man would go to Kansas for in summer he has not made clear. The temperature for longer than two weeks was about 102 in the shade and usually 115 in the sun.

"Every person in the towns carries an electric fan," he said. "Whenever they stop they plug in and hold the fan while it runs. No one works in Kansas. Wheat is only \$1.05. They think it should be \$3 and they sit around with their electric fans and tell the world about wheat."

"If a man calls anywhere and all the electric outlets are in use and there is no place for him to plug in, he gets into his Lincoln car and moves on to a more hospitable place. Every housekeeper is worrying all the time for fear there will not be enough places for callers to plug in. They have them on the porches, in the living, dining and bath rooms."

"This was the first time I ever ran across the individual electric fan. Of course, sometimes two persons can sit in the breeze from one fan, but this is seldom done. Everybody is retired in Kansas and who harvests the crops is beyond me."

PLAN BIG ALCOHOL PLANT; CHILLICOTHE
 Commercial Production To Be Object of New Project Is Report

Construction on a \$2,000,000 commercial alcohol plant, to be built by the Midwest Grain and Products company here, is expected to be started within the next thirty days. The plant which is to occupy 29.3 acres of ground granted the company by Chillicothe business men, will manufacture a high grade of alcohol to be used in making perfume. It is expected to be in operation by next March.

A plant capable of grinding 5,000 bushels of corn a day will be the first unit constructed. Later on it is planned to increase the capacity to 15,000 bushels of corn a day.

Equipment for making many other corn products in addition to alcohol will be added later, it is planned.

A group of eastern financiers are backing the new company, it is understood. Exclusive offices are at New York, while the operating offices are at Chicago and the plant offices at Chillicothe.
