

**TO SELL MILLIONS
STATE BONDS SOON**

Highway and Soldier Bonus Securities To Be Offered On

The sale of the highway bonds will complete the disposal of the \$60,000,000 bond issue authorized by popular vote. The entire \$9,000,000 will be needed to pay for highways now contracted for and largely under construction according to highway officials.

The disposal of the soldier bonus bonds will leave only \$2,000,000 of the \$55,000,000 bond issue authorized for this purpose unsold. The bond issue is expected to complete the payment of all bonus claims.

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ROOKIES ARRIVE AT CAMP CUSTER

CATCH THE INSPIRATION

Object is To Make Good Citizens Rather Than Soldiers; Some From Lake Co.

Tomorrow's men are soldiers here today, members of the citizens' military training camp. And how they like it!

Perhaps they might object to being called men of tomorrow for they feel and certainly act like men right now, these youngsters of 17 to 25. Here they are for a month of training, a vacation for them—a bit of prudence for the rest of us.

Chicago's big delegation of 685 youths, arrived at 4 o'clock this afternoon on a special train of fourteen cars. Off they came, cheering and waving hats, many shouting: "When do we eat?"

That was not the concern of the other group from Chicago and downstate Illinois that arrived at noon. Those had taken the Steamship City of Holland and disembarked at Holland, Mich. Most of them didn't feel like eating; they were only too glad to get the feeling of something solid beneath their feet rather than under their belts.

Advice from Chaplain But they arrived, nevertheless, eager for the fun of submitting to authority, of learning how to take care of themselves and of protecting their country. And, arriving, they learned it is not to be all work and no play—though, perhaps, they knew that before.

Chaplain Jenny told them that the main purpose of the camps was not to make them militaristic, war loving, or even good soldiers. No, the primary object is to make them good citizens with some military training.

Soon after arrival came the transformation. Into one building they went and out through another, into tents. They received barrack bag, undressed, put their civies in the bag, saving them for the moment along with their tooth brush, or, not having one, being issued one. A regular gave them a dab of tooth paste as they filed into the shower bath room, barrack bags being left outside. There they had a good time as well as a good bath.

Uniforms Carefully Fitted The next step was vaccination, then a dental examination, after which physicians examined eyesight, hearing, lungs, heart.

The doctors having finished the quartermaster begins. Each lad is told not to be afraid to let the officers know if the clothing issued does not fit. The army wants to fit them, and it will, they are informed. They get fitted, then go to the companies to which they are assigned, receive bed clothing, and a designated cot in a tent.

This was their supper tonight: Roast beef, mashed potatoes, brown gravy, stewed tomatoes, combination salad with boiled dressing, chocolate cake, apple sauce, bread, butter, iced tea.

Did they eat? They did. A visit late in the afternoon to Company A, commanded by Captain Paul N. Starling, disclosed many Chicago, Peoria and Lake county boys having the time of their lives singing "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here." Most of these arrived yesterday.

DRAW PICTURES OF MUSEUM ANIMALS

Art Classes Produce Interesting Drawings of Denizens of The Zoo

A unique and useful portfolio of reproductions of drawings made by the photostat process has been compiled by John G. Wilkins, instructor in the Art Institute school. Mr. Wilkins' classes have been visiting the Field museum and drawing from the splendid collection of animals which skilled taxidermists have posed in surroundings akin to their native environment. There are some one hundred and fifty plates in the portfolio, all forms of ornamentation and art nine by twelve inches. The classes are termed research classes and the theory is to go direct to nature for all forms of ornamentation and are study. Especial attention is paid to background, to give the proper "whiting out" and balance to a composition. The head of a deer or the antlers of a moose are taken and from them a design is worked out that may be used as a striking border on a stunning frieze; faint pencil lines used in constructing the design are purposely left on each reproduction so that a student in studying the drawings may see just how the artist worked out his problem. It is expected to place copies of the portfolio on sale at the school supply store.

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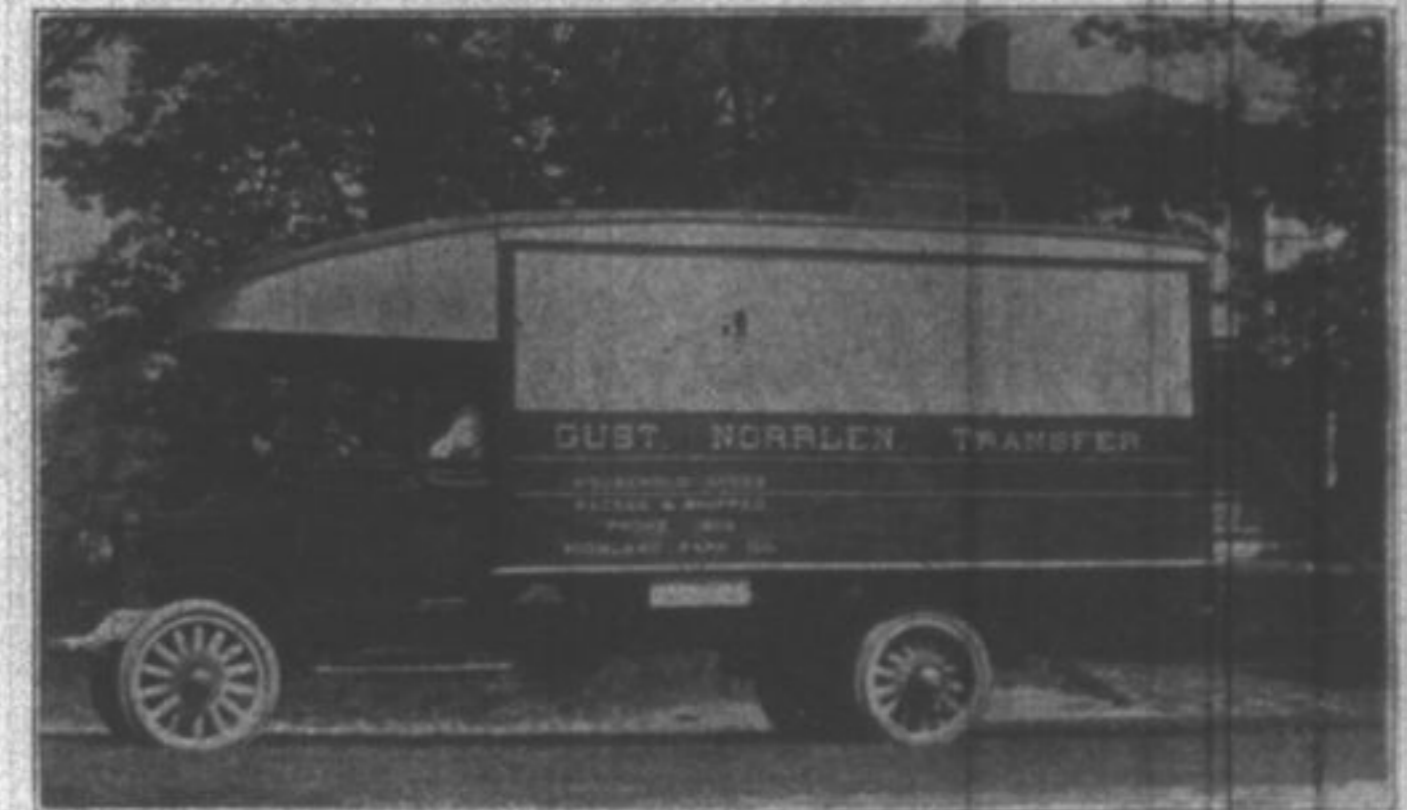
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
