STARTS DRIVE UPON ILLICIT OIL MIXING

CAMPAIGN IS STATE-WIDE

Fire Marshal Gamber Declares Hazard Increased by Sale of Explosive Mixture; Illegal

The opening campaign in a state-wide war against illicit oil selling has been started by State Fire Marshal John G. Gamber.

Oil mixing, where high explosive gasoline is mixed with a large quantity of lesser explosive oil, either intentionally or unintentionally, is a violation of state statutes, according to Mr. Gamber, because of the hazard which is placed on the buyer.

Deputies of the state fire marshal's office have found numerous stores of dangerous kerosene where mixture had been made with gasoline to increase the quantity.

Under the state law oil which will ignite at a temperature of less than

150 degrees Fahrenheit is condemned for illuminating purposes. Under the rules of the state fire marshal, oil may not be used in oil burning furnaces which flashes at less than 125 degrees.

"War against the illicit mixer of these oils, who combine products in order to get a higher efficiency from them, is now on," declared Mr. Gamber. "No doubt a great deal of this mixing is due to carelessness."

"When tanks or compartments on tank wagons are used one day for gasoline, it is very easy for mistakes to happen. However, we intend to prosecute every dealer who is found guilty of this dangerous practice."

"If careless handling of oil results in gasoline being mixed with kerosene, it is probable that kerosene gets into gasoline also, making a low grade gasoline which causes motor trouble in automobiles. Our department has no authority over the quality of gasoline, but we have authority over the hazards of fire and explosion due to oils. We are endeavoring to make dealers throughout the state use every care in handling these dangerous petroleum products and we feel that we ought to have the co-operation of everyone."

CHASE HOBBO GANG OUT OF TOWNSHIP

Deputies Fire Riot Guns in Air Over Tramps Camp Near Highwood

A large gang of hoboes who had established a camp in the woods west of the Northwestern railroad tracks at Highwood were routed last Friday night with riot guns by a squad from the sheriff's office.

Numerous complaints have been received from residents in that neighborhood, as it was believed that the hoboes were responsible for a number of minor thefts.

Deputies D. A. Weale and Harry Ahlstrom, headed by Chief Deputy Lester Tiffany, drove the hoboes out of camp with sawed-off shotguns after their leader had refused to clear out.

RADIO HINTS

When head phones give off an uneven sound, it means that one of the phones have changed in some way. The most common cause of this trouble is a loose diaphragm (which is the small metal disc) due to a loose ear cap. Tighten the caps. A few small-sized clamp screws will be found mighty handy around the home workshop. They are invaluable for holding down a panel while it is being drilled. Nice assortments can be found in the ten-cent stores.

Small metres, such as used for testing "B" batteries, are delicate devices. Watch out against jarring the needle, which is set in tiny bearings.

A joint in your serial or ground lead may be the reason why your set picks up so much "static." Remember that a joint which has been out in the air for six months or more will become badly corroded and a faulty contact will follow. To avoid this difficulty solder the joint. In the city a joint becomes oxidized quickly. Never try to test a storage battery by connecting a piece of wire

directly across the terminals. The size of the resulting spark is likely if any indication of the battery's condition, and the short circuit that it causes is harmful. If this treatment is persisted in, the battery will be totally ruined. A hydrometer is the only testing instrument that should be used.

One stage of audio frequency will seldom make much difference. It is that second stage which has the tremendous amplification jump.
