**KNEW WAUKEGAN IN THE PIONEER DAYS**  
**Owen Graham, Klondyke Miner, Visiting in County; Tells Of Early Times**

"If grandfather were alive today he would get a big shock" is an expression often heard, but it remained for Owen Graham, Klondyke and British Columbia gold digger to drop into Waukegan and Chicago after an absence of 66 years to get the thrill of his life. He came to Waukegan to try and pick out a few familiar faces and a few landmarks but found none—not a soul that he ever saw before, nothing remaining of the half dozen stores which dotted what now is known as Genesee street.

But Chicago was beyond his powers of comprehension. The Cook county building is located on the 160 acres which his father, Thomas Graham, refused to take for a song, because it was so swampy, coming to Lake county instead and homesteading on a farm three miles west and one-half mile south of Waukegan.

**Old Days in Lake County**  
"When I was a kid," Graham said in an interview in the Waukegan Sun, "there was no railroad running between Waukegan and Chicago. It took us three days to make a shopping trip to Chicago. We went by way of McHenry."

"We drove from Grayslake to Waukegan today a distance of 14 miles in about 25 or 30 minutes, on what we used to call the Plank road. In those days it used to take us an hour and a half to drive the three and a half miles from father's farm over the same road."

"We used to haul wood to Waukegan when there weren't 10 houses here. I can remember less than half a dozen stores. We hauled wheat to the grist mill of Berry & Woods, which was located where the Northwestern depot now stands. They had a wood and feed store where the Waukegan National Bank is constructing an eight-story building."

**GASOLINE TRAINS**

Gasoline propelled passenger trains are put in service on the main line of the Big Four railroad between Indianapolis and St. Louis, it has been announced. The road has ordered five of the trains, which have two cars each.

The motor cars will be used to keep up service on passenger runs that do not warrant the expense of a steam train, according to officials of the road. Two of the trains will be operated at No. 2 and No. 3 between other will run as No. 7 and No. 8 between Mattson and St. Louis.

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**OUR OWN HOLIDAY**

Indications are that this year's observance of Highland Park day on August 13 will surpass in number of features and excellence of program all previous civic holidays and to make the day the great success it should be, all that is necessary is the staunch support of home people. There is no doubt that this will be given heartily and liberally. The splendid efforts of the Business Men's association year after year to provide adequate attractions on Highland Park day are generally appreciated, and their decision this year to contribute a large share of the proceeds to the local playground project should add to the popularity of the association and attract increased attendance on our civic holiday. Nothing has been spared by the efficient committees working on arrangements to make this year's civic celebration the biggest and best in the history of Highland Park, and all that is needed is for the home folks to turn out and make it as nearly unanimous as possible. Judging from past years, there is no doubt about the result. Let's make it the greatest civic holiday the North Shore ever saw.

**NOT SO EASILY FOOLED**

The talk of labor being solid for an independent candidate, or any candidate, is not taken seriously by anybody who knows politics. Neither laboring men, farmers, clerks, business men nor any other body of citizens can be delivered to any candidate by anybody, nor by any organization. American citizens can not be herded like cattle. Labor, or any body of American citizens can not be misled by vague promises that can not be fulfilled, nor by fine phrases that mean nothing, and which everybody knows are simply for political effect—to get votes regardless of whose ox is gored.

President Coolidge, in a recent speech to the employes of the various government departments made it plain that he will cut to the bone all unnecessary expenditure of the people's money. Taxes must be reduced, and the president proposes that an example shall be set by the federal government in reducing expenses so that this may be effected.

The president did not mince words in his address. He pointed out that the business of government had been established on an efficient basis and that he intended that it should be kept that way. He emphasized the fact that one of the greatest perils of an extensive republic was the disregard of individual rights. He said: "A government which lays taxes on the people not required by urgent public necessity and sound public policy is not a protector of liberty, but an instrument of tyranny. Unless the people can enjoy that reasonable security in the possession of their property, which is guaranteed by the Constitution against unreasonable taxation, freedom is at an end. The common man is restrained and hampered in his ability to secure food and clothing and shelter. His wages are decreased, his hours of labor are lengthened."

The president pointed out in most emphatic terms that he stood today as he always has for the strictest economy in the expenditure of the people's money. He pointed out that the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, expenditures amounted to over \$5,000,000,000 and that the next three years under the budget system the expenditures were brought down to \$3,795,000,000—\$3,697,000,000 and \$3,497,000,000 respectively. He pointed out that the public debt had been reduced \$2,722,000,000 during this same period and that the saving in interest alone to the people had been more than \$12,000,000 each year.

**WOMANLY WOMEN AIDED BY COLLEGE**

HELPS THEM EVERY WAY

Alumnae Secretary Declares It Benefit; Does Not Unfit Girls for Old Occupations, Claim

Flat denial of the popular idea that college unfits girls for the old-fashioned "womanly" occupations is made by Miss Anna Louise Slusser, alumnae secretary of the College for Women of Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.

In order to find out if college women were using their training for practical purposes, Miss Slusser sent questionnaires to 1,500 graduates. Replies were received from 1,407.

They showed that 1,020, or 75 per cent. of the alumnae are engaged in home making or teaching, and that very few are following business careers.

"The only other occupations well represented," says Miss Slusser, "are those of secretary, librarian and social worker. And to gain admission to these professions, additional study must be taken following completion of arts courses."

**Big Problem**  
"We don't question the excellence of the home-making and teaching professions. But it is a well demonstrated fact that not every woman has the opportunity to become a home-maker, and the teaching profession is a crowded one. The problem of the woman college graduate today is much the same as that of the old-fashioned gentlewoman suddenly cast upon her own resources: what can she do to earn her living?"

"A few can afford to spend more time and money for professional training. They become lawyers, dentists, librarians, etc."

"But think of the business and professional opportunities open to women today, of which this list gives but a suggestion! The little 16-year-old graduate of business college can slip in on the strength of her varying ability to take dictation and run a typewriter."

**Need Training**  
"However, the college woman—mature, cultivated, refined as she may be—is barred because she doesn't have the password, 'Business Training.'"

"Modern business is eager to absorb all the college men who are willing to begin at the bottom. It

finds all sorts of things for them to do. It never demands preliminary business training on them.

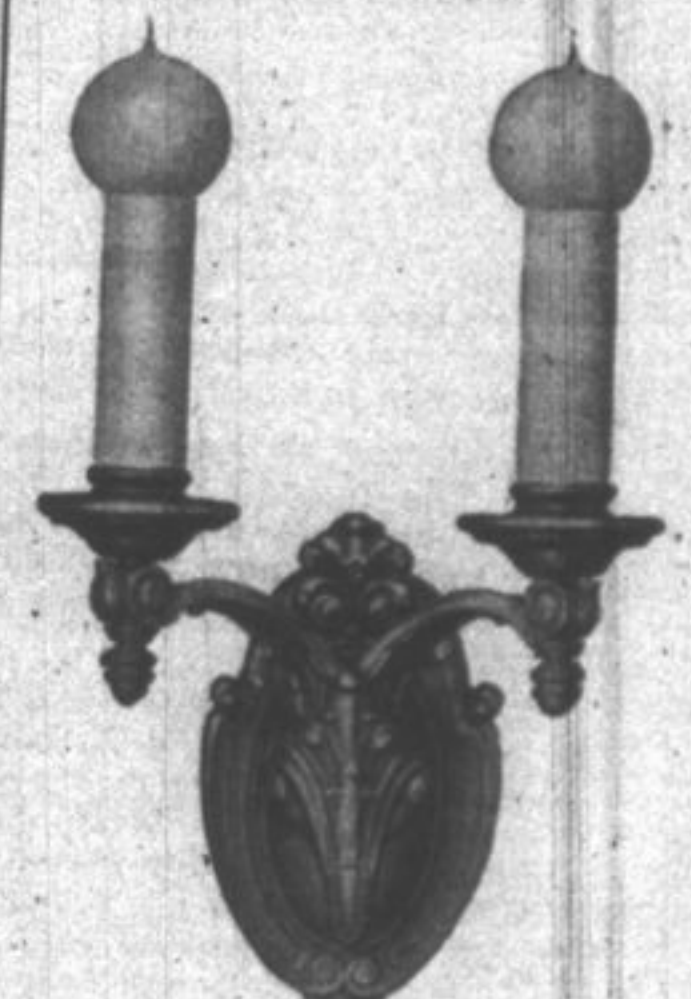
"The college woman is just as willing to start at the bottom, but modern business' one place for starting women seems to be at the typewriter."
