The child had been called home about 7:30 Friday evening and ran directly in the path of a Hudson coach going only about fifteen miles an hour, driven by Mr. C. H. Cooley of 5227 Hutchinson street, Chicago, who was exonerated from blame, because the accident was unavoidable. Little June, who had not seen the approaching car, was struck in the temple and knocked down on the pavement. The fall crushed her skull. She was rushed to the hospital and operated upon immediately. Dr. Becker was in attendance. About midnight the child's temperature was normal, and it was thought she would recover. About 3 o'clock her temperature was 107 and death followed shortly afterwards.

NO PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO REPORT

Revenue Department Notifies Capital Stock Returns Time Extended

No penalty will be inflicted for failure to make capital stock returns to the government July 30, according to an announcement by Mrs. Mabel G. Reinecke, collector of internal revenue for the first district of Illinois.

Owing to a delay in the distribution of the new forms for such returns Mrs. Reinecke has been advised by Washington that an extension has been granted for making capital stock returns until September 30.

"Forms 707 and 708 for filing capital stock returns covering the period July 1, 1924 to June 30, 1925, under section 700 of the revenue act of 1924," Mrs. Reinecke explains, "have been revised but the forms were delayed in distribution and the government has granted an extension without the assertion of penalty for delinquency if filed on or before September 30."

"The change in the filing schedule and the extension of time is of considerable interest and importance to all corporations affected by the act and I feel that all corporations should be properly apprised of the status of the situation so that they may take advantage of it without any fear of being penalized."

"Any further information in the matter that may be desired by any corporation will be given cheerfully by this office."
