INTERESTING NEWS BRIEFS FROM STATE

HAPPENINGS IN ILLINOIS

Short Items From Various Communities Regarding Occurrences There in Last Week or Two.

As a feature of class day exercises at Vassar, girl students defeated their fathers in a baseball game. The score was 13 to 10.
Honduras has gone into the fight-promoting business, having learned there is more money in boxing bouts than in revolutions.
Several women have qualified to act as markers and referees in this year's championship tournament of the Pacific Northwest Golf association.
Early in the history of the Yale-Harvard boat race the event was rowed over a two-mile course, which was increased to three miles in 1855 and to four miles in 1876.
Canada has nearly 350 golf clubs and more than \$25,000,000 has been invested in land and buildings. The amount spent each year on playing golf in the Dominion easily exceeds that figure.
Yeggenmen robbed the First National bank at Waltonville of Liberty bonds and other securities valued at \$30,000 and escaped.
Stephen Mann, twelve-year-old son of Walter Mann, was killed at Chester when he fell from his bicycle and was struck by a passing automobile driven by Forest Ferguson.

One dollar per bushel for 8,000 bushels of corn was recently paid Seymour Miller, manager of the Kemp farms, west of Paris. The grain is now being delivered.
A campaign to raise \$100,000 for the building of a synagogue and community center has been launched by Joliet Jews. Rabbi David Sautz is directing the drive.
A check for \$100 and a letter of commendation was received by Amos Laurant for having put out a fire in a car loaded with volatile oils when a train was wrecked at Litchfield.
Northwestern college at Naperville, conducted by the Evangelical church, will adopt a fall building program totaling \$250,000. A memorial auditorium will be the first new unit erected.
Babies, 1,000 strong—triplets, twins and individuals—will compete for honors at the Illinois State Fair Better Babies conference, to be held at Springfield September 13-20.
A garage and 42 automobiles were destroyed at Bloomington by fire with a loss of \$40,000.
Virgil Gordon has resigned as coach of the Farmer City high school and will engage in business in El Paso.

The formal opening and dedication of the newly constructed Odd Fellows hall in Moline will be held on August 16.
Fire companies of northern Illinois and southern Wisconsin held their annual tournament at East Dubuque on July 30.
Mrs. Nannie Conrad, fifty-two, wife of John W. Conrad, president of the First National bank of Cowden, was found dead, hanging in a grape arbor.
Rev. Frank G. Sayers, Baptist minister and expert swimmer, saved the life of Joseph Teeter, thirteen who got into water beyond his depth in a park lagoon at Freeport.
A Junior Ku Klux Klan is being formed at De Kalb. The organization is open to sons and brothers of K. K. K. members, the age limit being twelve to eighteen.

A model army camp, with sleeping tents and kitchen tents, will take care of the housing and feeding problems of approximately 300 boys who will attend the boys' state fair school at Springfield from September 13 to 19.
Otto G. Roehling, cashier of the North Avenue State bank and widely known among business and professional men, was found dead from asphyxiation in the bathtub in his apartment at Chicago.
Alleging alienation of the affections of his wife, Ray L. Edwards is suing Alvin E. McGath for \$10,000. Mrs. Alvin McGath has filed suit for divorce at Farmer City, alleging infidelity and naming Mrs. Edwards as correspondent.

If the city will provide ground on Market Square the Exchange club will obtain funds and erect a \$39,000 soldiers' Memorial building next year, the city council at Rock Island has been informed.
One hundred and nine million glasses of malted milk were drunk by thirsty Illinoisans during 1923, according to reports made after a survey by the dairy marketing department of the Illinois Agriculture association.
Removal of Camp Grant's Eagle and Flag monument, erected in 1917, is under consideration because of signs of dangerous decay. Efforts will be made to secure funds to build a suitable monument in honor of the men who trained at the camp.
Resources of banks in Illinois outside of Chicago increased \$8,653,349 and savings deposits increased \$5,368,583 in the period between March 31 and June 30, according to a report made public to the state's auditor's office at Springfield.
