

BIG BROOM CORN CROP IN ILLINOIS

Illinois will cut a large crop of broom corn this year, estimates of A. J. Surra, federal agricultural statistician show. A total production of 10,500 tons of broom is indicated, compared with a production of 3,800 tons last year and the average crop of 6,000 tons.

This year 45,000 acres are devoted to the broom corn crop compared with 37,000 acres last year and the average of 22,000 acres. This largely accounts for the increased production.

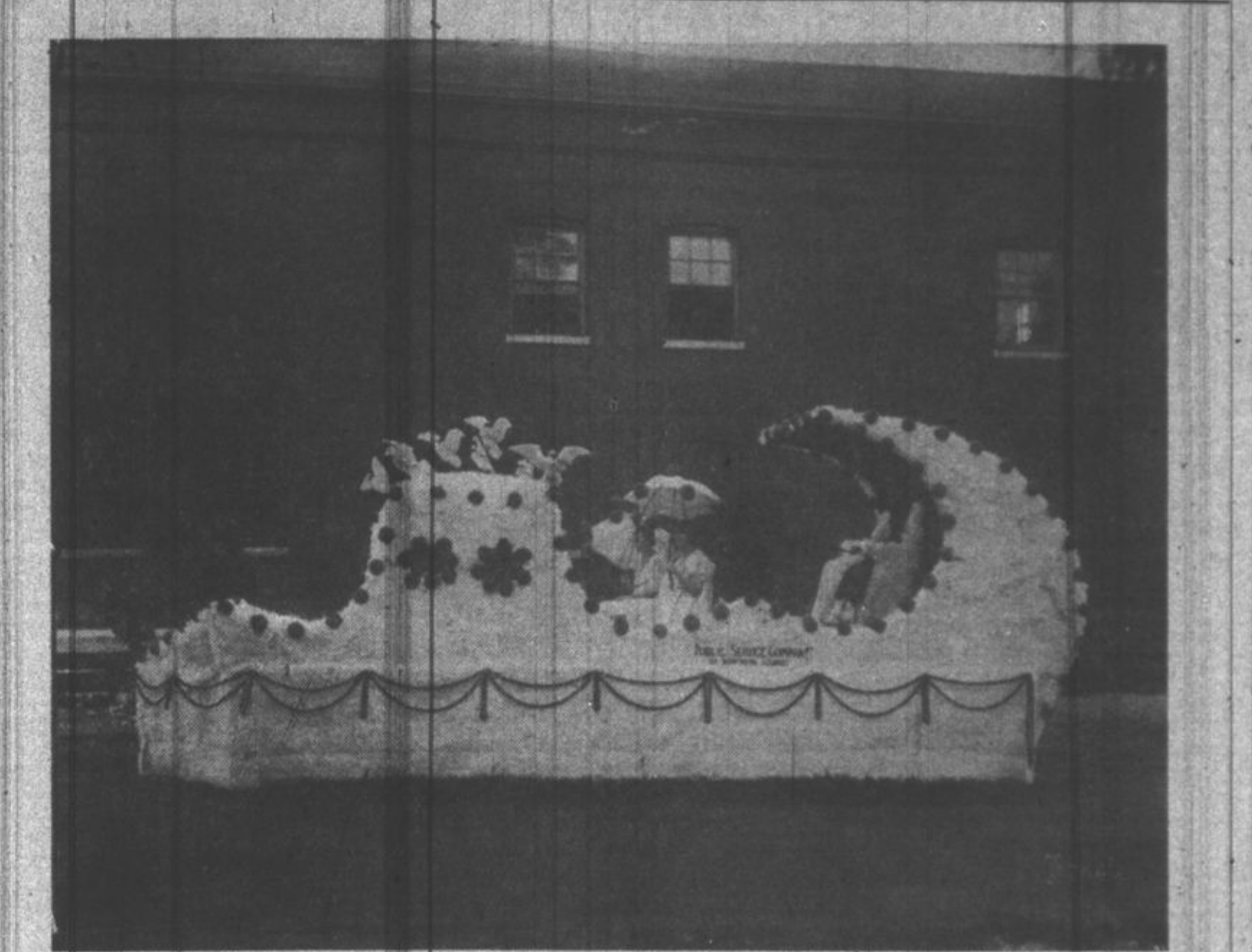

BAD WATER DANGER TO AUTO TOURISTS SHOULD EXERCISE CARE

Increasing Percentage of Typhoid Among Travelers Due to Unsafe Water; How to Avoid

Modern traveling facilities are not so pure blessings to the human race, according to Dr. Isaac D. Billings, state health director, who declared in a bulletin issued today that the automobile makes typhoid fever a distinctly bigger problem in Illinois than it otherwise would be.

While the people who are content to remain at home in the cities are reasonably safe from typhoid fever and similar intestinal diseases because the public water supplies are generally good, no such advantage rests with the tourists, campers and excursionists who depend upon local sources for drinking water and who frequent the "O' swimmin' hole along the highways, the director said.

Growing Percentage of cases of this disease in Illinois, reads the bulletin. "This is demonstrated by the fact that fully half of the annual typhoid fever incidence occurred during August, September, October and November, the period immediately following vacation. Careful surveys of cases occurring in cities have frequently shown the origin to be in rural and summer resort localities.

"City folks get in the habit of drinking all the water they want, wherever they want it without the thought of danger! This habit goes with them to the country where water supplies are not inspected and where regular sterilization is impossible.

Unhappy Results - The result is frequently unhappy for the excursionist himself who drinks heartily from any convenient water supply and who in turn exposes other members of his family and friends when he comes down with typhoid fever.

The state department of public health is doing everything in its power to protect the health of the people at all times but the people must assume an individual responsibility for protecting themselves under many conditions.

How to Avoid Danger

The matter of roadside water supplies may be safely solved in a number of ways. These include the use of sterilizing tablets in or the boiling of all drinking water drawn from questionable sources, or taking water supplies from only those sources known to be safe. Campers and tourists ought to keep constantly in mind, also, the fact that polluted water always becomes polluted in the first place by some act of man. This thought should lead to exercising a high sense of responsibility for the safety of others and the consequent practice of leaving their picnic and camping sites clean and sanitary.
