STUDENTS DO NOT DO SUCH THINGS
Principal Sandwick Takes Exception to Vague Charges in City Paper

Principal R. L. Sandwick takes exception to a story in a Chicago newspaper recently, in which a general way-North-Shore high school students of 15 years and older were accused of conducting and participating in rough dances at which hip liquor was said to be a conspicuous feature.

Regarding this allegation Principal Sandwick emphatically declared that in his estimation it was without any foundation in fact. "I am fairly well in touch with activities of North Shore high school students during vacation," the principal said, "and I can say there has been no such dance conducted by any of them during the summer. Many of the students of North Shore schools are absent from this section during the summer and those remaining are mostly employed and too tired from their work at night to think of dances of the character described. As to drinking, the charge that high school students of 15 years or thereabouts are in the habit of carrying and using liquor is absurd as a general thing. I find that the great majority of our students are fine young people, and it is a shame that their general reputation as a class should be thus attacked."

DIES IN LAKE IN RESCUING 2 GIRLS
Chicago Fireman Drowned in Bluff Lake Sunday; Three Others Saved

Edward J. Rooney, fireman attached to squad 7 of the Chicago fire department and a veteran of the World War, was drowned early Sunday in Bluff lake, near Antioch, after he had rescued his sweetheart and another girl.

Rooney, with his sweetheart, Miss Lillian Post, 2431 S. Spaulding avenue, Chicago, and Miss Fort's chum, were crossing the lake in a rowboat. Pappano while trying to change seats caused the craft to capsize. All were hurled into the water. Rooney went to the aid of both young women, conveyed them to the overturned boat, and told them to hang on until he brought help. He then started to swim ashore.

Somewhere between the boat and the shore he sank, probably seized with cramps.

ordinance to be submitted to the council and the board's recommendation. A resolution was adopted awarding the contract for paving a system of streets in Sunset terrace subdivision to the Chicago Heights Coal company, at \$150,583.20; special assessment No. 280.

The county court having entered judgment conforming the assessment for the South Sheridan road paving, including bridge over ravine, a resolution was adopted by the council authorizing advertising for bids for this contract, which are to be received at 5:15 p. m. Friday, Sept. 19.

Engineers Winder & Mareh presented Estimate No. 3 and final of Highways Construction company, on sanitary sewers in Northwood Manor; amount due, \$309.09, allowed.

A resolution of final acceptance of the Northwood Manor sanitary sewers was adopted also. The total cost is reported as \$11,383.93.

The board originated by resolution an improvement plan for the paving of St. John's avenue, from Laurel avenue to Sheridan road. The estimated cost is \$33,920.00. A public hearing is scheduled for 5:15 p. m., Sept. 19.

HIGH SCHOOL GRID TEAM TO SEE GAME

J. A. Peet, graduate of the four year course in athletic coaching at the University of Illinois, now coach at Deerfield-Shields high school, Highland Park, is a forehanded person. He is arranging means by which his team may witness the Illinois-Michigan football game October 18, at the dedication of the new memorial stadium.

Many other high school teams from all over the state will also see the game. Danville's team will be the guests of the Kiwanis club of that city. Mahomet merchants are making up a fund to send their team.

High school football cards show a decided lack of games for the homecoming week end. What games there are, will be played on Friday, October 17, so that they will not interfere with the big game. Colleges are also playing their games on Friday. Urbana and Champaign high schools have received offers from all over the state to play on local fields on either Friday afternoons or Saturday morning.

The Michigan alumni club, of Chicago, has ordered a block of 300 seats for the game while many Chicago Illini alumni will see the game. Benton Illini will attend in a body again. Last year they chartered a special train and more than 300 attended. Parties from Bloomington, Peoria, Decatur and Danville have also signified their intention of coming. The general ticket sale will open September 22. Application blanks will be mailed out the last week in August.
