## NEW TEACHERS AT DEERFIELD-SHIELDS

### Several Additions to Faculty And Their Qualifications; 37 Are Returning

Several new teachers have been added to Deerfield-Shields high school faculty for the coming year. Mr. J. A. Peel, the new athletic director and gymnasium instructor for boys, began work on Tuesday. He comes recommended by the athletic department of the University of Illinois. Coach Zupke named three equally successful and competent coaches for the position vacated by John L. Rothacher. They are Saulwechter of Seattle, Becker of Duluth, and Peel from the little town of Batavia. Mr. Peel being nearer at hand secured the position. Under his direction Deerfield-Shields teams will remain the powerful contenders they have been hitherto. He is a fine manly upright coach, well fitted by training and character to be a leader of boys.

Another teacher is Mr. Frank B. Peers, graduate of Millikin, who has taught in the high schools of Clinton and Alton, Illinois. Highland Park grade and grammar schools reopen for the 1924-25 year on next Monday morning, Sept. 8. All arrangements for a good start have been made in each. Plans and lists of teachers are given herewith.

**Elm Place School**  
Of the staff of 36 teachers with which Elm Place will re-open next Monday morning, six will be new to Highland Park. Miss Harriet Marks of Chicago, a graduate of Gertrude House, comes to serve as Miss Fazio's assistant in kindergarten, taking the place of Miss Maloney who was married in June. Miss Mary Davis goes to the Francis Parker school as assistant in seventh grade and her place in third grade will be filled by Miss Victoria Luther, a graduate of the University high school and Normal university. Miss Luther was born in Highland Park and was for a time a pupil in Elm Place. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Luther, later moved to Hammond, Ind., but are now living in Chicago. Miss Katherine McMunn, a graduate of the Charleston normal comes to take the place of Miss Mamie Dorsch who asked for leave of absence to continue her studies in the University of Illinois. Miss McMunn will have been beginning fourth. Miss Evelyn Wienke of Beloit, a graduate of the Columbia School of Music, is to take the position vacated by Miss Mildred Lund who goes to Claremont, Calif., to be a member of the teaching staff of Pomona college. Miss Wienke is to divide her time between Elm Place and Lincoln Avenue schools.

**Succeeds Peterson**  
William E. Cunningham of Charleston, a graduate of the Normal and a teacher of experience, succeeds Mr. Peterson as teacher of manual training in the upper grades. The new teacher of general science will be Bert S. Leach, a graduate of the University of Chicago, who had charge of the work in biology and athletics in the high school at Paoli, Ind., last year, and who has held the position of camp naturalist at Camp Owasippe, Mich., during the present summer (Continued on page 7)

Splendid Match Last Sunday on East Park Course; Laing Low in Club Championship Prelims

John Rouse, Jr., won the Highland Park open championship defeating J. Gantor 1 up in a 36 hole match Sunday on the Park District golf course. At the first nine Gantor was 2 up shooting a 76. Playing "Sonny" Rouse on the 18th green Rouse had trouble with his pitch shots all morning. Playing was so even that it took birdies to win.

**Afternoon Play**  
In the afternoon Rouse was always up. With 5 to go he was 3 up when Gantor let loose a string of birdies and evened the match at the 84th. They halved the 35th with 4's. The last hole decided the match. Gantor hooked his drive into the trees, played a beautiful one just short of the green. The best he could get was a five and Rouse's four was good enough for the match. Rouse shot a 76, 77, 76, 78 for the 36 holes.

## REV. FATHER GATES DIES AT HIGHWOOD

### BELOVED PRIEST PASSES

### End Comes Friday After Brief Illness; Funeral Tuesday Large; Cardinal and Many Friends

Rev. Simon J. Gates, priest in charge of St. James Parish, Highwood for the past 10 years, died at his home there at 8 o'clock Friday morning, following a very brief illness. Death was due to an attack of angina pectoris.

Father Gates was one of the best known pastors of the Catholic church in this section and greatly beloved by the people of his parish, whom he had served faithfully and well during the many years of his residence here.

He was 47 years of age and was in the prime of life. He had built up a large congregation which included many in Highland Park and vicinity, as well as in Highwood. He was pastor, adviser and friend of all his people, and many who did not attend his church found in him a safe counselor, and he was held in high esteem by all the people of this district, and of all denominations.

A number of relatives reside in the east. His parents are both dead and buried in the Crystal Lake Cemetery.

## Cardinal Present

The funeral service was held at St. James Church, Highwood, at ten o'clock Tuesday morning. Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago was present and participated in the ceremonies, which were in charge of Father Girard of Mokena. About 75 priests from Chicago and other neighboring cities attended. Judge Caverly of Chicago also was present.

Attendance at the service was large, the church being filled to capacity and with many standing in reverent attention outside during the ceremonies. It was one of the largest funerals ever held in Highwood, indicating the high regard felt by the people for the deceased priest.

Business houses in Highwood also were closed during the services.
