### RESIGNS PASTORATE DEERFIELD CHURCH

Rev. Martin Luther Thomas Is Going to San Pedro, California

Rev. Martin Luther Thomas, pastor of the Deerfield Presbyterian church during the last four years, has announced his resignation and plans to go in about three weeks to San Pedro, Calif., naval base and seaport of Los Angeles where he has accepted the pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church, with a membership of 550 and property valued at \$100,000, with plans for doubling that amount.

Mr. Thomas led in the erection and dedication of the new church at Deerfield. He has been one of the champions in Chicago of military training and of an adequate program of defense for the United States. He is chairman of the joint commission of the Chicago Church Federation and the American Legion having the purpose of fraternal co-operation. He was the first chairman of the Church Federation committee on radio messages, by which many clergymen of Chicago have been privileged to broadcast Sunday afternoon chapel services.

The Rev. Mr. Thomas came to Chicago from the Pacific Coast to attend McCormick Theological seminary, from which he was graduated in 1921, after he became pastor at Deerfield. He also attended Lake Forest College for a year.
