CAN'T BUILD BIG PLANTS AT MINES

Lack of Water for Condensation in Many Instances Would Prevent Use

Electric power plants of large size cannot be built adjacent to coal mines. unless the latter are located on or near rivers, affording a constant supply of pure and cold water sufficient to meet the large condensing requirements. Electric power plants require from 400 to 600 tons of water for condensing purposes for each ton of coal used in the plants.

Furthermore such plants, as a rule, cannot be constructed at the mine mouth in such a way that coal can be hoisted directly from the mine to the plant's coal bunkers. In most cases, the coal would have to be handled and transported some distance.

In addition to this handling charge, which cannot be avoided, the expense. of bringing such a vast volume of condensing water to the plant would be far greater than the cost of transporting the coal to a location where ample water was immediately avail-
