POLICE INTERESTED IN AUTO THEFT NEWS
Discovery of Bandit Operations May Have Bearing on Loss of Cars Here

Police of North Shore cities are interested in dispatches from Carlinville, Ill., telling of the discovery there of a band of alleged automobile thieves whose ramifications are believed to have taken in the entire state. A number of automobiles have been stolen in Lake county during the last year and the advisability of sending an officer to Carlinville with a description of the cars stolen here, in an effort to see whether or not any of the cars recovered answer the description of those stolen here is being considered.

Cars have been stolen in Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Highwood, Highland Park, Waukegan and elsewhere in Lake County and the police of those communities may join in making a check. They believe there is a good possibility that some of the stolen machines may be recovered.

Following is a copy of the dispatch from Carlinville which has

aroused the interest of the police of Waukegan and the north shore: "County and state officials investigating the activities of the alleged band of automobile thieves said to have had headquarters on a farm near Gillespie, now believe the ring may have been statewide in scope, and may have had connections with other automobile stealing gangs throughout Illinois and possibly other states. Five alleged stolen Ford cars already have been recovered and two men have been taken into custody and are being held pending further investigation."
