

**STICKER CRAZE IS BANE OF MOTORISTS**  
**Windshields Plastered with All Sorts of Advertising Schemes**

"Substitute the word sticker for cannon and the tourist of today might be heard to say: 'stickers to the left of them, stickers to the right of them, stickers to the front of them,' all because of the desire of certain trail associations and commercial clubs to advertise their trails and fair cities," complains a bulletin issued by the touring bureau of the Chicago Motor club.

"Road survey car number 1, in charge of John Graham, has just returned from a 5,000 mile journey in twelve northwestern states, and reports that an epidemic of stickers seems to have seized that part of the country. The custom of plastering stickers all over the windshield, is a dangerous one and should be discouraged. The touring bureau has written Stephen T. Mather, director of the National parks asking his help in the campaign to eliminate the craze. At present cars entering the National parks are required to carry stickers showing that the admission fee has been paid. The touring bureau has suggested that a check be issued in place of the windshield sticker."

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested, that bids for the furnishing of all labor, tools and materials necessary for the construction of a connected system of sanitary sewers to be laid in, along and under Burton Avenue, Pleasant Avenue, Broadway Avenue, Green Bay Road, Roger Williams Avenue, Highland Place, Washington Place, Blackstone Place, Northmoor Road and Flora Place, were opened on the 5th day of September, A. D. 1924, and the Highways Construction Company being the lowest responsible bidder, the contract was awarded to the said Highways Construction Company on the 12th day of September, A. D. 1924.

11900 lineal feet of eight (8) inch internal diameter tile pipe sewer laid complete at an average depth of nine and five-tenths (9.5) feet at Two Dollars and Twenty-Two Cents (\$2.22) per lineal foot.....\$30858.00

2225 lineal feet of ten (10) inch internal diameter tile pipe sewer laid at an average depth of fourteen (14) feet, at Two Dollars and Seventy Cents (\$2.70) per lineal foot.....\$6007.50

The above tile pipe sewer shall be constructed of vitrified, salt-glazed, hub and spigot tile pipe with Portland cement mortar and oakum joints, mortar composed by volume of one (1) part Portland cement and two (2) parts sand, mixed with sufficient water, and includes all grubbing, trenching, sheeting, pipe laying, backfilling, restoration of pavements where cut, and removal of all surplus excavated materials.
