CHICAGOAN FINDS A VALUABLE WORK
Famous Painting Is Discovered In Europe and Brought To Chicago Art Institute

The joy of collecting rare objects of art is a pleasure that only those who have wealth and leisure may follow assiduously. Fortunately, those who are so blessed, at least in many cases, after they have acquired a valuable collection, share it with all others who may care to see.

There are many such collections in Chicago, and they are frequently placed on view, often in the galleries of the Art Institute. Several are at present installed in these galleries—collections of valuable paintings and works of art—such as the Cyrus H. McCormick, Sr., collection, and Mr. Mrs. Frank G. Logan collection and the Mr. and Mrs. Francis Neilson collection. These are still on exhibition and will remain throughout September.

Discovers Treasure

In searching through the art stores and among the curio shops of Europe, Mr. Neilson tells of the time he came upon an old piece of canvas that a curio dealer offered him for a small sum. Mr. Neilson examined the canvas, which was covered with the accumulation of dust of many years and thought from the faint high-lights showing through the grime, that it might prove worth cleaning. So he bought the picture. The expert cleaner removed six or seven layers of dirt, grime and varnish, when lo! a rare painting by the Dutch master Pieter Jansz. Pourbus, (1510-1564) appeared. It proved to be the portrait of Coligny, a famous French admiral and leader of the Huguenots. The head of the admiral had been cut from the original canvas and all that remained surrounding the head was a few inches of canvas, showing a part of the background and a portion of the uniform. After complete restoration the painting was found to be a masterly piece of portraiture.

showing the strong features and forceful character of the admiral to splendid advantage. Mr. Neilson had it framed and it is now in his collection at the Art Institute.

Leader of Huguenots

Coligny was born in 1519 and was killed in 1572. As leader of the Huguenots he became a powerful factor and King Charles XI placed great reliance upon him. But the King's mother, bent on counteracting Coligny's influence, ordered the massacre of the Huguenots. Coligny escaped, but afterwards an assassin, a servant of the Duke of Guise, in conspiracy with the queen-mother, killed him and threw his body into the court at the feet of King Charles.

WAUKEGAN MEN FIND REPTILE

A spreading viper, never before found "running wild" in so northerly a clime, was discovered very suddenly by Irving Duncan, of Orchard avenue, Waukegan, when he stepped upon it last week while he and his brother, Donald Duncan, were walking the railroad tracks at Beach. This species ranks next to the rattlesnake as a venomous reptile, according to persons who viewed the snake, after the Duncan brothers had lassoed and brought it in a box to the Waukegan police station, where officers and firemen dispatched it.

Stray dogs and cats took one glance at the snake and then scrambled to more remote quarters.

The viper is believed to have been transported in a box car from some state bordering on the Gulf of Mexico, where these reptiles abound. A number of Mexicans gave the snake one look and stepped back. "U-h-h," gasped one, "snake keel man; poison Mucha snake lak dese in Mexico."

After that the curious crowd stepped back a few more paces, but the snake, apparently was so cold it did not attempt to strike, but spat venom at its captors until a fireman dispatched it with a board.

RACINE IS TO HAVE NEW "GOLD COAST" SUBDIVISION TO BE SAVED

Tract Purchased for Homes of North Shore Millionaires According to Papers In That City

The following from the Racine Times-Call of August 1, will be read with interest by North Shore people generally:

Another tract of land on Racine's gold coast situated north of Wind Point has been purchased for subdivision into residence lots.

Several days ago, according to a deed filed in the office of the register of deeds, the Caledonia Sand company sold to Fred H. Thwing, millionaire oil operator of Kansas City, Mo., 23 acres of land for a consideration of \$28,000.

More Property Purchased

It was announced today that Mr. Thwing plans to plat the property and will sell the lots for residence purposes. The property has a frontage of 1,000 feet on Lake Michigan, with a beach, ravines and groves. Purchasers of lots will be given the riparian rights.

From the four mile road, north, property along the lake front is being purchased by millionaires who are planning to erect country homes there. Some of the parcels will be platted and sold for residence purposes but it is understood that when a parcel of property is sold by the present owner the deed will contain a clause that the residence to be erected shall cost not less than a certain specified amount it being the desire to have only beautiful homes in the gold coast of lake front home colony.

Homes have been erected in the district by Capt. William Hamford, H. M. Wallis and A. C. Frank. Persons residing in Lake Forest and engaged in business in Chicago have purchased the Lambertson farm near the Milwaukee county line and will improve it. This property has a lake frontage of several thousand feet.

The location of all the property purchased or about to be purchased by millionaires, is regarded as the most ideal residence property along the chain of lakes.

May Build Station

Building up of the lake front district will be followed by a new station at the county line on the North Western road and a train schedule for the benefit of the residents. The station at the county line is the nearest railroad point to the district. It will be necessary for the railroad company to put on a train, leaving the County Line station, at about 8 a. m. in order that the Chicago men who are to occupy these homes may be at their places of business at 9:30 a. m. The train probably would leave Chicago at 4 p. m. The North Western road now runs a "Gold Coast" special daily between Milwaukee and Chicago, picking up the heaviest travel at Lake Forest, the homes of Chicago millionaires, who now are preparing to build homes near Racine.

NIGHT GOLF IS NEW WRINKLE IN TEXAS

Members Houston Country Club Play With Flashlight Illumination

The Houston, Texas, Country club has found a way to play golf after nightfall. The problem of darkness has been solved by the use of flashlights and Houston's enthusiasts now can play golf 24 hours a day.

Four expert players—Tommy B. Cochran and W. C. Hunt, from the amateur ranks, and Willie Maguire and John Bredemus, professionals—demonstrated the possibilities in a thrilling night match over the 18-hole course, the pro team winning three up.

Two flashlights were used through out, one trailed on the ball and the other held over the putting green at the next hole. In every tee shot there was a black void to be played across. The player could see the ball and the distant beam of light which marked its destination but had to call on his golfing intuition to know how much power to put behind the drive. The only variation from standard rules was that a lost ball could be replaced without penalty. But three balls were lost. Each player had a number and the same number was painted on his ball.

Maguire had the best individual score, with a 76. Far for the course is 72. A gallery of 200 followed the match, which had been intended as a demonstration of the practicability of luminous balls. The luminous balls, however, failed to live up to expectations and the flashlight idea was evolved upon the spur of the moment and was successful.
