**VETERAN KEEPER OF LIGHTHOUSE RETIRES**

**Captain Davenport to Quit Post At Waukegan Sept. 30; In Service 48 Years**  
Capt. A. J. Davenport, veteran lighthouse keeper of Waukegan harbor and for 48 years in the employ of the government, who retires Sept. 30, will move with his family to Waukegan Park, a suburb of Chicago, next week.

The Davenports are packing up preparatory to their departure, and their many friends regret that they have decided to move away. Capt. Davenport has a two flat building and a cottage at 7672 Coles ave., Waukegan Park, and he and Mrs. Davenport will move to that address so they can look after the property.

Capt. Davenport will be succeeded here by Sam Jacobsen, of Racine, who is also a veteran in the lighthouse service but is considerably younger than the local keeper. Jacobsen will take charge of the lighthouse here on Oct. 1.

Capt. Davenport is 70 years old. He has an enviable record in the lighthouse department and two years ago was presented with a badge by the government in recognition of efficient service. He started as assistant keeper at Waughanance Pier, at the entrance to the Straits of Mackinac, where he was employed for five years. At Twin River Point he was advanced to keeper, and later was transferred to South Chicago where he served twenty-four years. He came to Waukegan lighthouse May 1, eleven years ago.

**FRUIT CROP SHOWS SOME IMPROVEMENT**

**BETTER NOW IN ILLINOIS**

**August Reports Show Prospects More Promising; Apple Crop Small But the Quality Is Much Better**

The Illinois fruit crop took a turn for the better during the past month, a report made public by A. J. Surratt, agricultural statistician, stated. Apples, pears and peaches showed improvement over the prospects a month ago. Although the crops will not be large, the quality of the fruit is reported above average.

Total apple crop prospects for Illinois is for 5,390,000 bushels compared with 7,370,000 bushels a year ago and the five year average of 5,320,000 bushels. The state's commercial apple crop is expected to be 755,000 barrels, compared with last year's 1,351,000 barrel crop and the average of 935,000 barrels.

Illinois peach orchards will produce 450,000 bushels this year, Surratt estimated. This compares with 675,000 bushels a year ago and the average crop of 479,000 bushels. The crop was normal in the more Southern counties and a failure elsewhere.

A good pear crop, both in quantity and quality, is looked for in the southern counties where most of the commercial fruit is grown. The crop in the northern half of the state is reported rather light. State pear production is estimated at 337,000 bushels compared with 307,000 bushels last year.

The Illinois grape crop is below the average with September condition reported as 70 per cent of normal, compared with the ten year average for September of 81 per cent.
