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#### HARBAUGH REPLIES TO SUN EDITORIAL

a profitable thing for the county to farm it, and the county probably could get along with half of it. There isn't a farm in the county which can make interest on the investment where the farm land is worth \$1,500. If the county is bound to do farming in connection with its poorhouse, it might be real economy to utilize low priced land. That is the position of many Libertyville people who want the poorhouse moved so their village can expand to the north. They contend 155-acre tract has not been a good investment, simply because the cost of operation has been too great, and not because of any fault of the supertendent or aids. A poorhouse is different from other institutions because valids and therefore unable to work to any great extent, and therefore the farming they do is of little consequence. Many Libertyville people are of the opinion that if the county maintained only enough of a farm to buildings it would be cheaper in the long run to buy the produce that ordinarily is being raised on the poorfarm land and let somebody else try to make a living farming \$1,500 an acre property."

Mr. Harbaugh's Letter Waukegan Sun by Supervisor Harbaugh, in reply to the above editorial:

"Waukegan Daily Su "Waukegan, Ill.

'Gentlemen: "Referring to your editorial in the September 26th issue of the Daily Sun on the county farm situation please permit me to say a few words through the columns of your paper on the action taken by the county board of supervisors on the proposition of submitting to the voters of Lake county the passing of a bond issue at the November 4th election to raise the necessary funds to erect modern home Libertyville so that the dependent people of the county might be pro-

perly cared for. "Having served on the county farm committee for nearly two years believe that I am in a position to know something of the real needs of the institution. I was also appointed a member of a joint committe of six at the June session of the county board authorized to make a thorough investigation of the home and report the result of such investigations with recommendations to the county board at the September session.

"The joint committee met at the County farm July 9th and after a thorough investigation voted unanimously to recommend that the county board take steps immediately to replace the present old buildings with new and modern ones to properly take care of the present and future needs of the institution. They also recommended that the county board take the necessary steps to bring the matter before the voters of the county at the November 4th election and that a bond issue not exceed-

ing \$250,000.00 be voted upon. "The report and recommendations of the joint committee were unanimously adopted at the session. The county clerk was authorized to have a resolution properly drawn up authorizing the levying of a tax amounting to six cents per dundred dollars on the assessed valuation of the property in the county to provide the necessary funds to pay the interest and retire the bonds at maturity, the tax levied to be spread over a period of years from 1924 to 1943.

"After the board had adopted the resolution of the committee unanimously certain real estate men and others interested in the development of Libertyville presented a petition to the board requesting them to consider the selling of the County farm in order to enable the village to expand to the north west. This committee from Libertyville reported that an offer had been submitted for the purchase of the farm and asked that the board appoint a committee of three members to confer with them and to inspect different sites which they had to offer. Also to receive a proposal for the purchase of the present County farm and to report at the September 24th session. The chairman appointed Mr. H. C. W. Meyer, Mr. Wm. J. Obee and myself as such com-

"Our committee met with the one from Libertyville Monday September 22nd and inspected nine different farms, all of which were found to be undesirable for county farm purposes. On Wednesday morning September 24th the committee from Libertyville submitted a written proposal to our committee offering to pay \$800.00 per

acre for the present County farm. "As shown by the records our committee after due consideration reported to the board that the price submitted by the Libertyville committee was entirely too low to be considered. and recommended that the proposal be refused as we were of the opinion that the price offered did not represent more than one third of the real value of the property. It was the cpinion of our committee that if the proposal to sell had been accepted by the board at the price submitted it would have meant a great loss to the county as they would have had to pay much more for less desirable property anywhere in the county and would have


