

LOSE A MINUTE AND SAVE LIFE, SLOGAN
Secretary of State Sends Out Little Discs Bearing This Legend

Secretary of State Louis L. Emerson not only issues automobile licenses to motorists of Illinois but he is giving out with them the policy

of "Lose a minute—Save a life." This slogan stamped on metal discs the size of a half dollar is to be found in the pockets of thousands of automobile drivers throughout the state and accident figures indicate it is also in their minds.

Gross after gross of the discs have been distributed by the secretary. Reports to the bureau of vital statistics here indicate the campaign

for "sensible" driving is having effect and the total number of automobile deaths in the state in 1924 will be lower than that of 1923.

Taxicab companies of some cities have supplied their drivers with the discs to be passed out to customers as a silent argument against excessive speed. Their use has cut down demands from patrons to "step on it," reports say.

HEAD OF TRAINMEN FOR U. S. SENATOR

ON REPUBLICAN TICKET

W. N. Doak, Well Known Union Man, To Oppose Glass In Virginia; Endorses Coolidge

W. N. Doak, vice president and national legislative representative of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, has accepted the Republican nomination for United States senator from West Virginia, and will run against Sen. Carter Glass, Democrat.

The Republican candidate has been for years one of the most prominent railroad labor leaders in the United States, and his entry into the lists as a protagonist of the Republican cause is expected to have a considerable effect on railroad labor throughout the country.

Defender of Labor
 Mr. Doak is a strong defender of the rights of union labor. He is a warm supporter of President Coolidge and is one of the many prominent labor leaders who resent efforts to deliver the railroad labor vote to any candidate. All he would say today was: "I am in the race to fight. I believe in President Coolidge—and of course I don't mind saying what has been so often said already that the votes of American labor cannot be delivered and cannot be controlled."

Endorse Coolidge
 A strong endorsement of the attitude of President Coolidge throughout his public career towards labor was brought to the White House today by two labor men, C. J. Mahoney, chairman of the legislative board of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, for the state of Massachusetts, and Harmon T. Drew, chairman of the legislative committee of the order of Railroad Conductors for the same state. They came to Washington, they said, to assure the President of the confidence they had in his leadership and to express approval of his record in regard to labor during his long tenure of office as representative, senator, president of the senate and governor of the state of Massachusetts.

Friends Among All Classes
 "The president's friends among all classes of labor," said Mr. Mahoney, "among the men in the mills, in the foundries and on the railroads can be counted by the hundreds of thousands. They are growing in numbers daily as the workers of the country are looking into his record, which is consistently a record of sympathy and active support for the men and women who toil. No political exigency will deprive President Coolidge of these friends. They are his supporters for always."

MANY DEATHS FROM DISEASES OF HEART
Highest Percentage in State According to Report of Health Dept.

Heart disease carried more Illinoisans to their graves during the past year than any other one cause, figures of the state department of public health show. A total of 11,989 deaths from this cause were reported in the state during the year.

Pneumonia was the second great aid of the grim reaper in Illinois, taking a toll of 7,263. Then came suicide, murder and accidents with a total of 6,707; cancer, with 6,412; chronic neuritis, with 6,390; cerebral hemorrhage, with 5,551; pulmonary tuberculosis, with 4,900; diarrhea and enteritis, with 2,369; premature births, with 2,809; influenza, with 1,820; diabetes, with 1,366; appendicitis, with 1,145; arteriosclerosis, with 1,122.

No other single cause of death accounted for as many as 1,000 fatalities last year in Illinois.

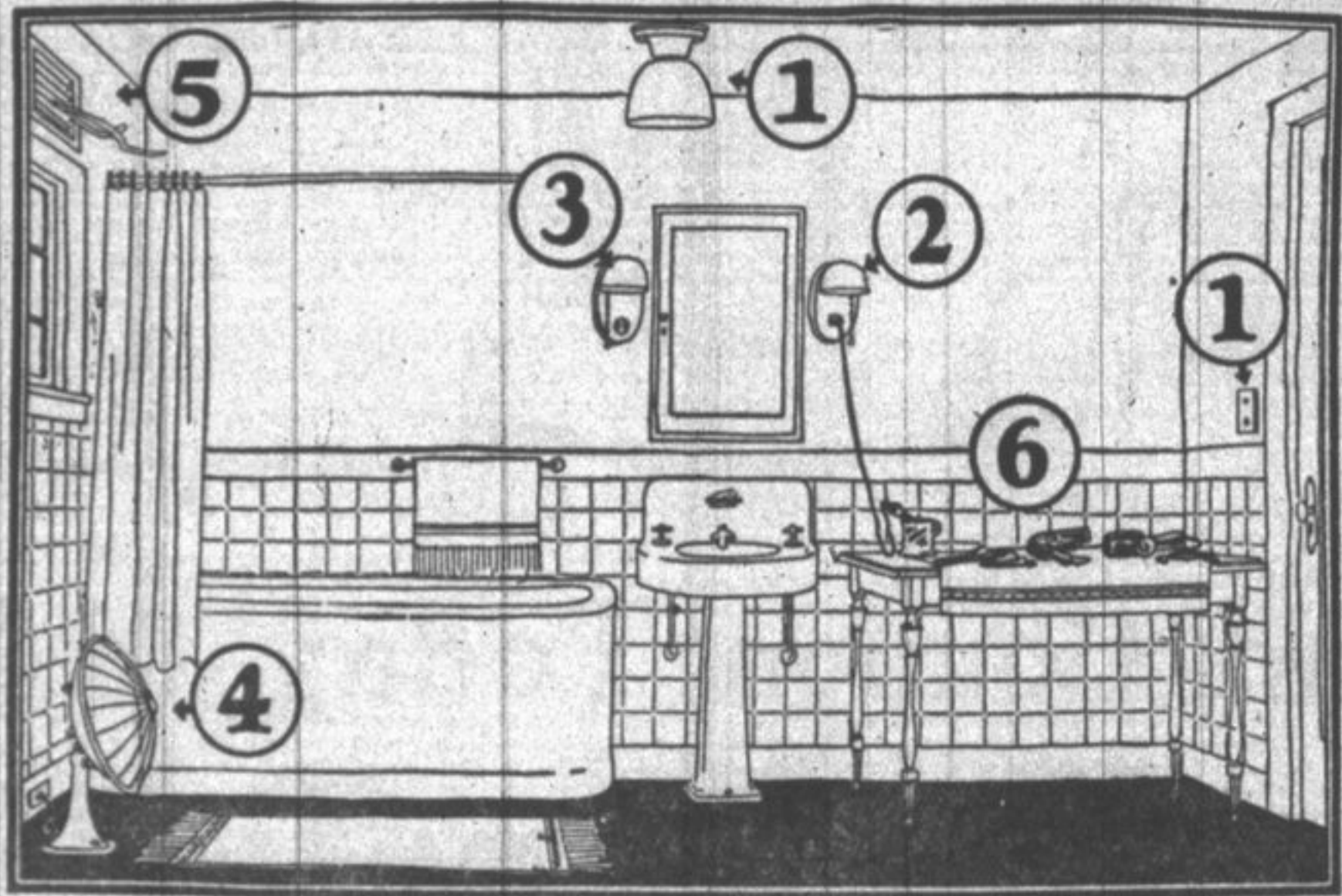

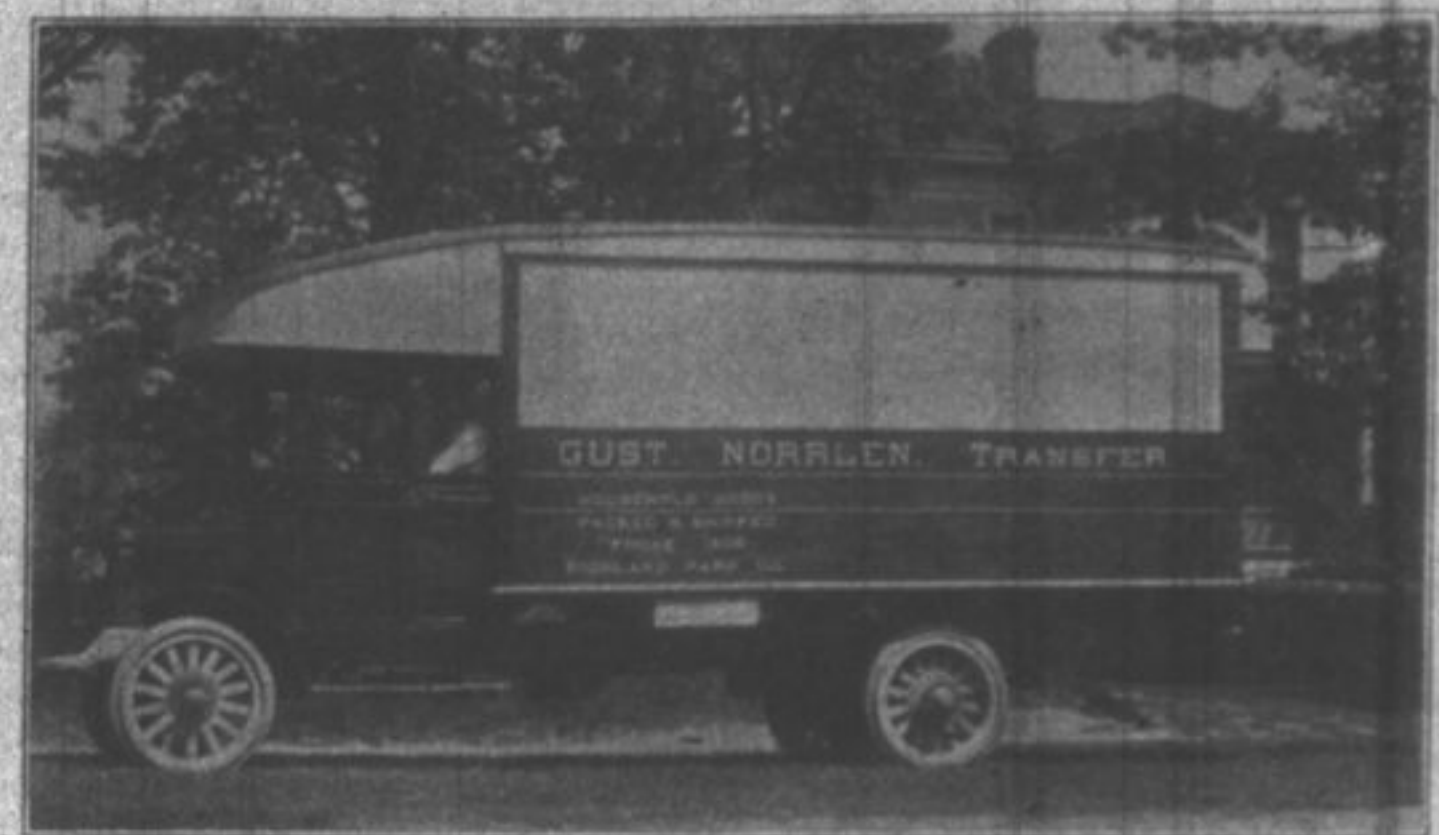
