**OF QUESTIONABLE SOURCE**

**Automobilists Are Urged To Co-operate With the Chicago Organization Regarding Protection**

Local motorists are urged to consult the staff of the Chicago Motor club when in doubt regarding any offers made by representatives of questionable automobile organizations, according to an announcement made by H. M. Brown, manager of the club. "This step is being taken as a means of protecting the motorist from being misled by 'gyp' organizations which are flourishing in all parts of the country" he says.

**Co-operation Urged**  
Mr. Brown also points out that the motorist's co-operation will be sufficient compensation for the service of the club in this connection, since every effort is being made by clubs affiliated with the American Automobile association to rid the motor world of these outfits that promise much and take everything for themselves.

"The A. A. A. has been actively engaged in putting fake outfits out of commission, and the latest information is available to all who care to consult this club regarding the matter," he says. "Many motorists are interested in motordom to the extent where they are anxious to support every worth while organization, and it is in their eagerness to help that they are often caught by professional swindlers.

**Not Difficult Matter**  
"It is not a difficult matter to decide whether an organization is legitimate or otherwise if only the matter is discussed with the staff of the local club, for here the motorist will observe the conventional procedure that is typical of the great body of A. A. A. clubs. He will immediately observe the difference between a club that is elaborately depicted in print and one that is actively engaged in offering service to thousands of motorists.

"We want the motorist who is in doubt to know the facts and all the officers of this club ask in return is the privilege of knowing more about these 'gyp' clubs that shake the public's confidence in the sort of organization work that is so urgently needed in motordom."

**RADIO CLUB RECALLS OLD SUIT GAME HERE**

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**STUDENTS PROBING SUBNORMAL MIND**

At least fifty advanced students of abnormal psychology at Northwestern university are banded together in one class to investigate, from humanitarian standpoint, the subnormal mind both of children and grownups. Under Prof. A. R. Gilliland, these fifty students have agreed to journey to the South side of Chicago each Tuesday and participate in a clinic conducted by Dr. Mandel Sherman, of the neurological staff of Northwestern university medical school. Tests upon sub-

normal children, who will be in attendance with the approval of their parents, will be conducted and a close and intelligent course in this interesting realm of research will continue throughout the year.

"Our psychology students at Northwestern are keenly alive to the vital need of continuous study in the psychology of the abnormal mind," commented Prof. Gilliland. "All of us realize what comparatively little progress has been made in this subject and the very fact that our class of fifty is the largest in the history of the university is in itself suggestive of this interest."

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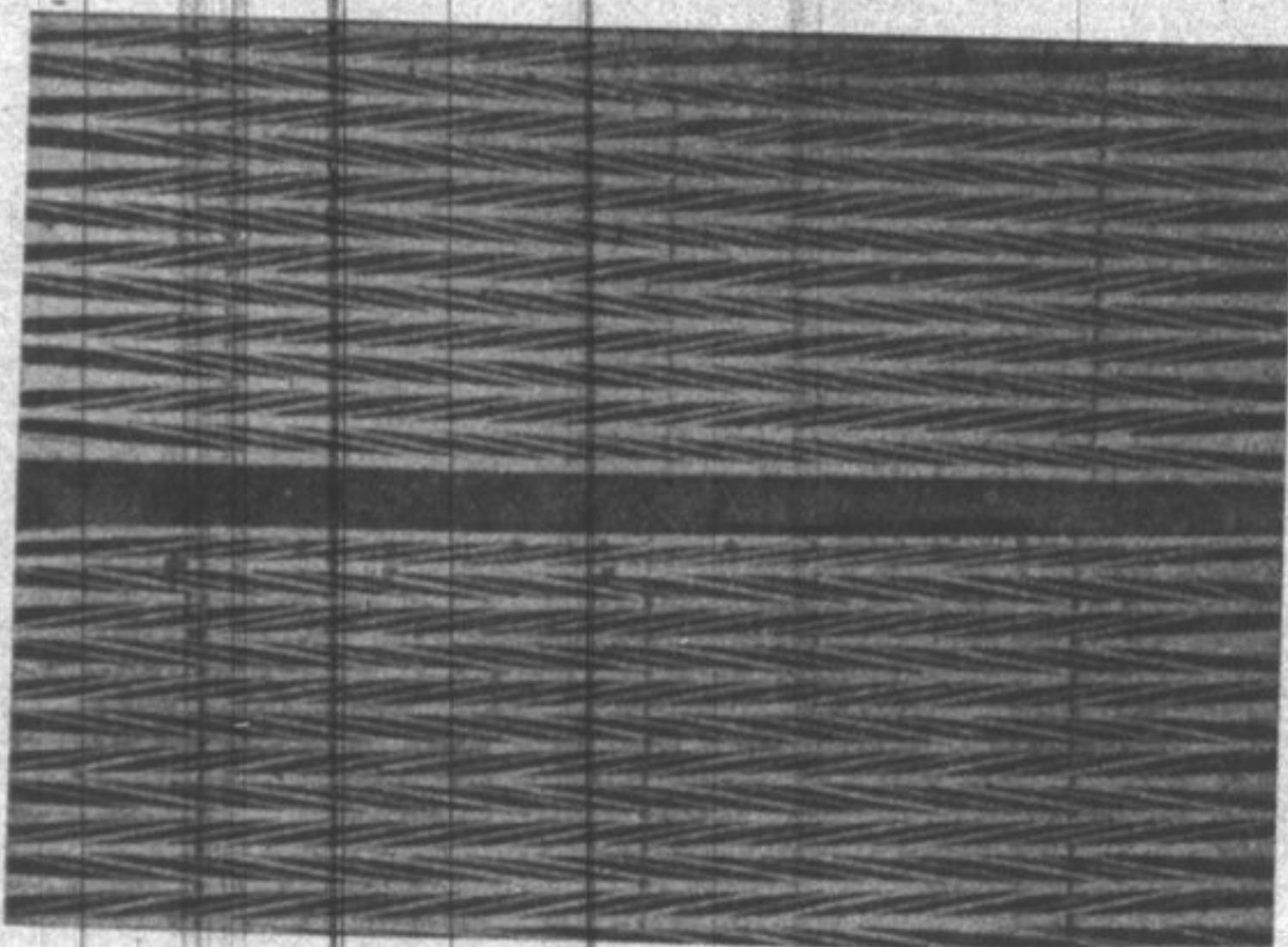

IDENTICAL panels with frames four feet high and eight feet long, constructed with sills and studs 7/8x3 1/2 in. and studs placed 16 in. on centers, were prepared.

FRAME A had one side covered with 1/2x6 in. dressed sheathing nailed at each stud with 8D nails, and the other side covered with common lath spaced 2 in. on centers and staggered in the usual way.

FRAME B was covered on both sides with Expanded Wood Lath sheets 8 ft. long and 16 in. wide, fastened at the juncture of each rib and stud with 5D nails.

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
