Under present conditions no more than one amending proposition can be placed befor the voters of the state at one time. Several times in recent years amendment of the constitution, especially in its revenue provisions, has been urgently demanded, but generally in such instaces there have been offered two or more bills before the legislature, one blocking the other because of the provision admitting vote of the people on more than one amendment at a time.

The legislature finally agreed to submit this proposition for an amendment of the article of the constitution on amendments, so as to permit, if the proposition carries on Nov. 4, as many as two proposed amendments to be submitted to the people hereafter by one legislature.
