Proposed Bond Issue

In connection with this campaign explanation of the proposed bond issue for continuing hard road work in the state without suspension may be pertinent here.

At the coming general election in November, the people of Illinois will determine the future road building policy of the State. At this time, the voters will either approve or reject the proposed \$100,000,000 bond issue.

During the past few years, Illinois has enjoyed the greatest road building era any state has ever had. In a few years' time we have progressed from twenty-third among the states in the matter of improved roads, to acknowledged leadership in the road building movement. In each of the last three years, Illinois has led every state in the union in the mileage of roads completed, and in a few more years, at the present rate of progress, would be the best paved area in the world.

However, the end of the present year will see the last of the funds from the \$60,000,000 bond issue expended. Unless additional funds are provided, road work must be financed in the future from such current revenues as are available, after deducting such sums as are necessary for principal payments and interest charges on outstanding bonds and for road maintenance. This would mean that a comparatively small balance would be left, and that a greatly curtailed program would be necessary in the coming year.

Question for Voters

At the end of the present year, approximately 1300 miles of the present \$60,000,000 bond issue system will be unimproved. At least five or six years will be required to complete the system from current revenues. The question the voters of the state must decide then, are whether or not they wish to wait until 1930 to complete the present system, and whether or not the present system, when completed, would be adequate.

The proposed \$100,000,000 bond issue bill enacted by the last General Assembly, provides for completing the present 4700 mile system, and adding thereto approximately 5100 miles. This will give a total paved road system of 9800 miles, or approximately 10 per cent of the public road mileage of the state. In order to carry, the bond issue proposition must receive a majority of all votes cast for members of the General Assembly.

Failure to vote for this proposition is equivalent to voting against it. It therefore behooves each and every voter to become thoroughly acquainted with the fact about this great proposition, and to vote conscientiously and intelligently.
