### GREEK GOVERNMENT APPRECIATES AID

Says American Assistance Has Been Indispensable in Near East

"American aid has been indispensable in our program of refugee settlement and reconstruction," says the Greek government in a report issued through official channels. High praise is given to American charitable work for children, and the report adds:

"The Near East Relief during the past year has disbursed in Greece \$1,936,000, of which \$1,478,000 was spent for orphans and the remainder for adult refugees. It has distributed enormous quantities of clothing and has reunited thousands of refugee families. In addition to work in Greece, this organization carries on extensive operations in five other Near Eastern countries."

### LIGHTNING DOESN'T STRIKE ONE IF DOWN

"Lightning is a gentleman and observes the rules of the Marquis of Queensberry—it won't strike a man when he's down," according to electrical engineers who have experimented with man-made lightning.

The possibilities are that a man standing directly under a storm cloud would be struck fifteen times in one hundred strokes, while a man flat on the ground would be struck only once in a hundred strokes, they say.

2,000,000 volts of electricity having characteristics of lightning have been made by engineers, for experimental purposes. Lightning has a voltage of 100,000,000 or about one million times the voltage of a house lighting circuit. A bolt of lightning represents enough energy to drive an automobile five miles or to operate a toaster for one day, the experiments have disclosed.
