HISTORICAL SPIRIT CAUSED WORLD WAR

SO SAYS WRITER CRITIC

Alfred Guerdar in Article in Scribner's Discusses the Effect of Traditional Attitude

It was the historical spirit of the nineteenth century which caused Imperial Germany to go on a rampage, according to Albert Guerdar, who heartily condemns old methods of writing history in an article in the November Scribner's Magazine. Dr. Guerdar, who is a professor at the Southern Branch of the University of California and author of "Reflections on the Napoleonic Legend," in his article points to Voltaire as the founder of the H. G. Wells type of history. In speaking of the nineteenth century, he says:

Reaction Against Rationalism
The passion for history, which was such a prominent feature of the nineteenth century, was part and parcel of the Romantic reaction against rationalism. It was a nostalgic hankering for a vanished Arcadia. Gardens were adorned with ruins (cunningly fabricated); in the same way, feudal sounding titles were cherished (even when they were of home manufacture). Chateaux and mansions and Walter Scott are among the promoters of the historical spirit, which was the spirit of romance.

"It was the time when Truth would not be recognized, unless it were moss-grown, nor Beauty revered, unless it were worn-eaten. But the first ringing challenge hurled by sentimentalism against rationalism is found in Burke's 'Reflections on the French Revolution.' There we find, in impassioned words, the doctrine that the growth of human institutions must needs be slow and practically unconscious. Against the hopes of rapid and purposive progress, held forth by the philosophers of Enlightenment, Burke dared to assert 'the wisdom of prejudice.'

"Living man is the mouthpiece of dead, not of the unborn. In broad terms, we may say that Burke begat Carlyle, Carlyle begat Taine, and Taine begat Maurras, the brains of conservative France today. It was against Burke that Wilson tilted at the Paris conference—and was worsted in the joust.

"Reactionism, the Historical Spirit, and Reaction are not one and the same thing. But, in the nineteenth century, they frequently worked hand in hand. It was this invincible reverence for the past that made the progress of England so teazing, so fascinatingly devious and sluggish. Conflicting with a more open radicalism, it turned the course of modern French life into a series of baffling whirlpools. Worst of all, it hurled Germany, the Germany of Kant and Goethe, the most humane of all nations, into the abyss of the Bismarckian-Hohenzollern Empire. There lived no man so historically minded as the late kaiser, the restorer of medieval castles and medieval dreams."

WANT MILLIONS FOR NEAR EAST RELIEF

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS

Says in Scope of Activity and Sustained Interest Organization Has Written New Chapter

A committee composed of religious leaders of eighteen denominations in the United States has recommended that the Near East Relief continue its overseas work for at least three years, with an annual budget of not less than \$5,000,000. In its report, this committee says:

"In scope of activity, statesmanship, and sustained interest, this organization has written a new chapter in the history of world philanthropy. We most strongly commend its work to the religious forces and benevolence of America. We commend heartily its present educational policy.

Has Grown
"While many charities, begun during the seal of war, have slackened or collapsed, this enterprise has gone on with growing efficiency and increasing resourcefulness. Closing a decade of service, it is firmly established in the confidence of the American people. Begun as an agency of emergency relief, it has proved its ability to adjust its service to the needs of permanent reconstruction. This adjustment has been effected with marked skill and economy. Budgets have been measured by critical business standards. Salaries have been kept at a sacrificial level. Its collection costs have been moderate as compared with other organizations of similar purpose. Careful and continuous audits have been made both at home and abroad.

Restricted Operations
"We regret the fact that inadequate returns last year made necessary the premature discharge of thousands of orphans and the necessary neglect of a multitude of children in refugee camps, and we recommend to the churches an undiminished continuance of their support and co-operation.

"We recommend to the executive committee that the cash budget for the coming year be placed at not less than \$5,000,000, and that the program as outlined be continued for a three or five-year period as the need may appear, with the object of bringing these orphans to self-support and assimilating them into the social and economic life of the new Near East."
