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HAS'N'T ANY FAITH IN TURK, IT SEEMS
NEAR EAST AIDE'S VIEW

Says He Is A Smooth Prevaricator and Not To Be Trusted Under Any Circumstances At All

"The Turk is a gentleman, a liar and the cleverest person in the world in being able to pull the wool over the other people's eyes."
In this manner is summed up the character of "the unspeakable one" by C. C. Compton of 7931 South Paulina avenue, Chicago, a young Congregational missionary loaned to the Near East Relief, who recently returned from four years' labor in the interior of the new Turkish Nationalistic republic—Anatolia.
Will Not Tell Truth
"He is the most charming person imaginable when entertaining or in conversation," Mr. Compton told a meeting of the Chicago Congregational Ministerial union. "But, on the other hand, he will not tell the truth and becomes highly insulted if it is insinuated that his word is questioned. Because of that trait representatives of other nations have found it difficult to reach any international or trade agreement with Mustapha Kemal's government and the ultimate fate of the new republic is problematical."
"Two years ago we personally witnessed the reduction of a Christian population of 3,000 to less than 500 in Marsovan during a massacre and when inquiries were made by the European powers, Yussif Kemal, then foreign minister, stoutly denied that there had been any massacre or any trouble, despite the fact that the Christian quarter of Marsovan was still in smoking ruins, fired by the Turks.
Punished by Own Acts
"During the deportations that followed, Turkey was left without any professional class because the doctors and dentists and business men were either Greeks or Armenians so that Turkey is being punished by her own acts. It has always been the Turkish idea that it was easier to permit an Armenian or a Greek to conduct his business successfully until he had amassed money and then steal it from him.
No Truce
"There is no truce between the Turks and the Near East Relief. While we are devising every means of saving the lives of Armenians and other Christians, especially by feeding the orphaned little ones, the Turk is just as busy devising schemes to eradicate them. In this way they have almost succeeded. Fifteen years ago the Armenian nation numbered 8,000,000 people. It now numbers about 1,000,000.
"Never before has the call of the Near East been more urgent. Our problem now is not so much to save lives as it is to preserve these we have saved. During the massacres we endeavored to shield these persecuted people from the Turkish guns and bayonets and to save the women from living deaths and to feed the little ones left behind. Now we must continue to feed and train these little ones so that they shall be self-supporting and fitted to go out into the world within a few years when our work shall have ended."

SET ASIDE STREETS FOR NEW CHAUFFEURS
Motor Clubs Advise That Drivers Learn on Roads For Purpose
Believing that the beginner is entitled to every consideration when learning to drive an automobile but that the more experienced drivers should know where to expect the danger incident to the process of instruction, the Chicago Motor club is acting upon the suggestion of the American Automobile association by advocating the use of certain streets and localities which could be set aside for driving instruction.
At such restricted places, the club points out, newcomers would not be so likely to be annoyed by regular traffic, nor would other drivers be so likely to be surprised by the driving characteristic of the beginner.
According to H. H. Brown, manager of the club, if there were some common understanding between new and veteran drivers on this point there would be much less confusion as a result of the instruction process for beginners. As matters now stand instruction is now made more difficult than is necessary by placing the newcomer in traffic that does not favor him, and all drivers are more or less endangered by the unexpected appearance of persons who are just learning the ropes.
"Investigations made by the American Automobile association with which the Chicago Motor club is affiliated," he says, "revealed the fact that many accidents are a direct result of lack of co-operation in this matter of designation of certain areas for instruction purposes. The club would like to receive suggestions for favorable localities in which beginners might operate without danger to themselves or others."

Released in England, a toy balloon landed in Germany, 800 miles away.

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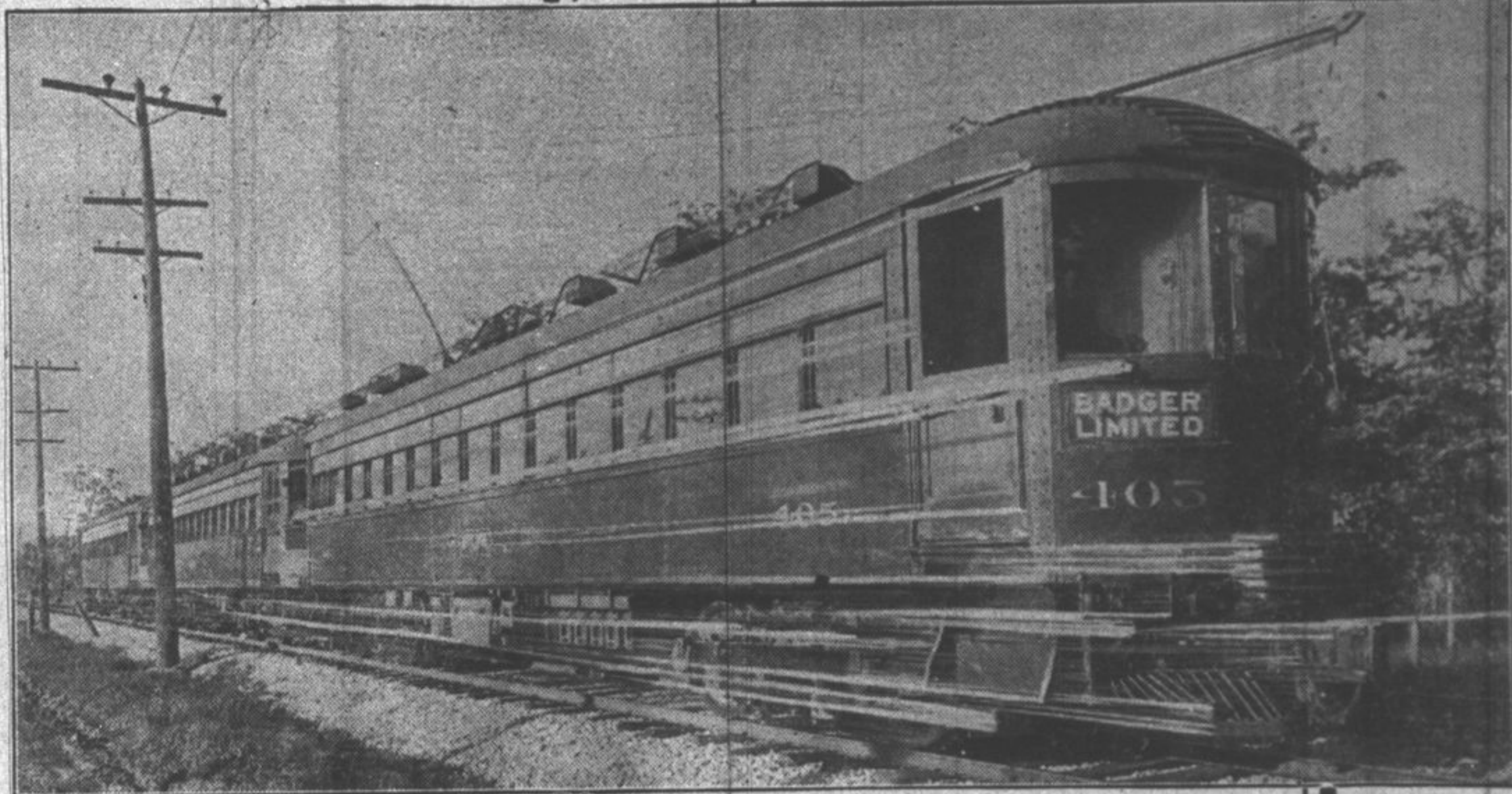
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
