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IS GREAT INCONVENIENCE

Litigation Over Bridges Causing Motorists Of This Co. and Elsewhere Much Trouble

North Shore and bewildered tourists Court on the Chancery side thereof, (35-36-37-38) main arteries of travel in the middle west have definitely abandoned hope of improvement in the Glencoe highway situation this season.

A report received from the district engineer's office of the state highway department indicates that the Glencoe detour in Sheridan road will be in force throughout the fall and winter because of court proceedings which have tied up work on the middle of the three small bridges, says the Waukegan Sun. Reconstruction of those bridges began last fall. The south bridge is complete now and open to traffic. The north bridge is practically ready for service, but the center structure is in status quo and will remain so until village legal difficulties are ironed out.

With greater Sheridan road paved and open over a distance of more than 700 miles from St. Louis north to Chicage and on from the Illinois state line through Wisconsin and into the Michigan cloverland, this devious and dangerous North Shore detour is considered one of the worst interruptions to traffic anywhere in the Chicago district. Sheridan road vehicles are forced to leave the historic and beautiful old trail at Glencoe and head west and north into the Green Bay road-a narrow and winding pavement which crosses the Northwestern and electric line tracks at grade at several points, is badly cut up in places by truck travel, and is as dangerous and difficult an artery for through traffic as any road to be found in the west.

The long delay in completing these bridges over the North Shore ravines has prevented practical use of state trunk highway 42 for about a year. The fact that it is one of the seven main highway entrances to Chicago and the direct gateway from the lake shore district to the north adds to the seriousness of the traffic interruption, Chicago engineers point out. It leaves the Waukegan road, several miles to the west, and the Green Bay road, a truck artery, the only available gate-

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
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
