PFANSTIEHL RADIO SET GETS FRANCE

Waukegan Man Hears Station at Lyons, France, Monday Night; Details Given

This community is now in touch with Europe, by radio. Mr. H. W. Atkinson, 1739 North avenue, Waukegan, using the new Model 7 receiver, designed by Carl Pfanstiehl of this city, was in touch with Lyons, France, Monday night and enjoyed a concert that was just audible on the loud speaker.

"I received several signals, which were indistinct," says Mr. Atkinson, "when at 10:15, after tuning industriously I finally heard a voice, indistinctly. An orchestra selection followed, just loud enough to be heard over the loud speaker. The music seemed to delineate in flutes. Then, lengthy announcements in French followed. This was very plain, and if I could have understood the French language, I could have made out what the speaker was saying, which shows the growing importance of knowing French nowadays. After the talk the music started again. I received this music on the Pfanstiehl Model 7 receiver, setting the three dials to 44-44-44 1-2 degrees, which is approximately 355 meters.

"This is correct for France, according to the advice I received from the office of the Herald and Examiner, Chicago, which is issuing me a certificate."

The telephone number of Mr. Geo. Rapson, local representative of the Minneapolis Heat Regulator was given wrong. The correct number is H. P. 2156.

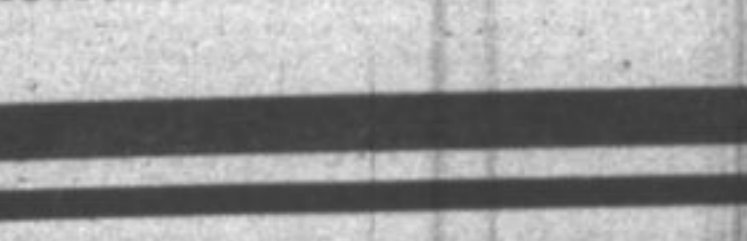
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
