**CLUB BULLETIN ON ROADS OF ILLINOIS**

**More Main Routes Open for Traffic For Thanksgiving, Is Expectation**

Numerous detours on Illinois highways will be closed and the main highways open for traffic by the time Thanksgiving tourists hit the highways, according to the latest bulletin issued by the touring bureau of the Chicago Motor club. The bulletin on Illinois roads shows that:

The four-mile detour on Ill-10 east of Riveron is badly cut up on account of rains, but is passable without chains.  
 On Ill-31 the Ripley detour is in poor condition and the best route from Springfield is through Jacksonville and Meredosia.

The state highway department advises that the following highways are open for traffic:

- Ill-1 from Marshall to Carmi.
- Ill-2 scheduled to be completely open from Mendota to Hayworth November 26, and now open from Clinton south through Decatur, Ramsay, Sandoval, and Duquoin to Cairo.
- Ill-3 now open from Milan to Aledo, Goodhope to Industry; scheduled to be open from Jacksonville to Whitehall on November 27 open from New Providence to McClusky.
- Ill-8 detour between Watseka and Gilman sched. for elim. Nov. 27.
- Ill-16 detour lifted between Charleston and Mattoon, also open from Shelbyville to Nokomis.
- Ill-17 open from Streator to Wenona.
- Ill-18 from Lamolle to Princeton

to open November 27.  
 Ill-19 open from Crystal Lake to the Wisconsin line.  
 Ill-25 open from Kankakee south through Gilman, Paxton, Urbana and Mattoon to Effingham.  
 Ill-26 open from Freeport to Polo.  
 Ill-28 open from Sheffield to Galesburg and Ill-8 open Galesburg to Burlington forming a hard road from Chicago to Galesburg.  
 Ill-31 open from Canton to Lewistown.  
 Ill-36 open from Pottsville to Jacksonville.  
 Ill-40 open from Mt. Carroll to Chadwick.

**OFFER PRIZE FOR ESSAY ON WAGES**

**\$5,000 Offered by University of Chicago For Treatise On Subject**

A prize of \$5,000 for the best original treatise on "The Theory of Wages" was announced last week by Prof. J. Laurence Laughlin of the University of Chicago, chairman of a committee on economic prizes.

To give contestants time for the necessary research, the committee will receive contributions until Oct. 1, 1926. The award will be announced as soon after that date as possible.

Prof. Laughlin's announcement introduced the contest as the possible forerunner of an annual prize for distinguished work in the field of economics.

The contest is to be announced in Europe as well as in this country. Foreign economists may compete, the committee said, provided their manuscripts are in English. Any point of view may be taken, and any phase of the wage problem may be discussed. Ownership of the copyright of the winning treatise is to vest in the donors, who will arrange for publication of the book, announcement said.

Prof. Laughlin's associates on the committee are Prof. John Bates Clark of Columbia university, Dr. Edwin F. Gay of Harvard university, Congressman Theodore E. Burton, and Prof. Wesley C. Mitchell of Columbia university.

**PICTURE PAINTED ON SPIDER'S WEB**

**Singular Work of Art in Possession of Dealer in Germany**

This Week

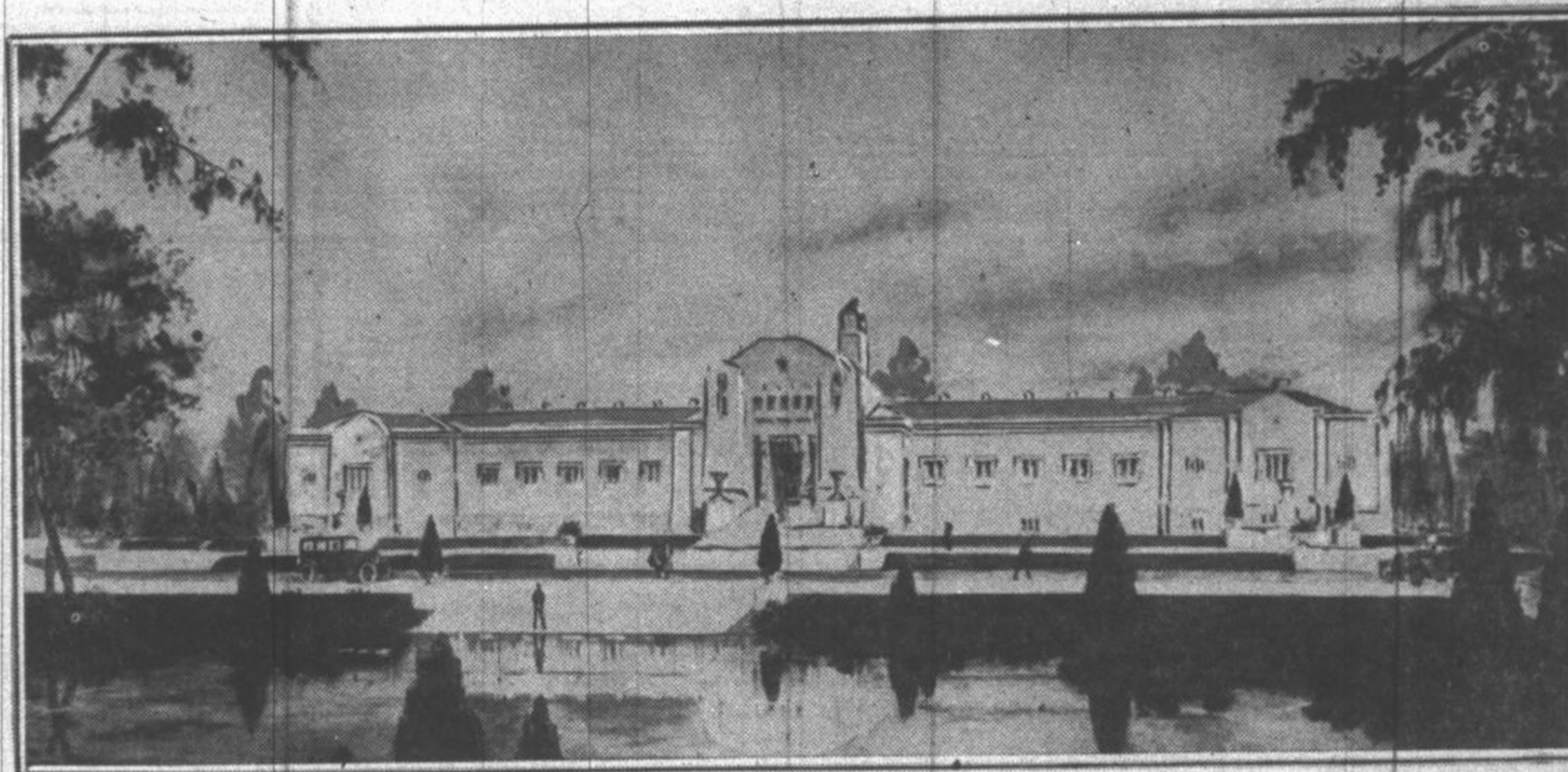
