

PLAN FARM CENSUS OF UNITED STATES

TO BE BIG UNDERTAKING

Department of Commerce Starts It Early in 1925; Services of Thousands Enumerators Required

The department of commerce is about to take a census of agriculture for the crop year 1924 and relating to conditions on or near January 1, 1925. This is the first census of agriculture to be taken between the decennial censuses; the Act of Congress authorizing it is based on the belief that, with rapidly changing conditions in agriculture, there should be a stock-taking as often as every five years.

Many Workers The enumeration will require the services of 15,000 to 20,000 enumerators acting under the direction of 212 supervisors, who have for the most part been selected from the employees of the bureau of the census and the department of agriculture. Employees of the forest service will secure the census returns for most of the farms within the national forest reserves in Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Idaho, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Tennessee, Washington, West Virginia, and Wyoming.

Sample questionnaires are being widely distributed to the farmers, to familiarize them with the information soon to be called for by the enumerators. In addition to the usual inquiries relative to production, values, and farm expenses, the schedule calls for the amount of taxes paid by the farm operator on farm property, including real estate tax, personal property tax, and special assessments. It is important to ascertain just what the burden of taxation resting upon the farm really is and how it compares with the amount of taxes paid by other interests. This may point the way to a more equitable adjustment of the tax burden.

WANT PUBLIC FUNDS DISTRIBUTED SOONER

Many Illinois Chambers of Commerce Urging Prompt Division of Tax Money Collected

Sixty-four chambers of commerce in Illinois have voted in favor of asking the next legislature to pass laws requiring the prompt distribution of public funds and all idle public funds. The vote was cast in general referendum No. 6 conducted by the Illinois chamber of commerce. Two-thirds of all chambers of commerce in the state, whose combined membership totals 30,000 business men and firms, have voted up to the present time, and every member has voted in favor of the proposed laws.

President Camlin's Comment Commenting on the questions involved in the referendum, President John H. Camlin of the Illinois chamber of commerce said: "Various public bodies notably school boards, are compelled at certain periods every year to borrow money for operating expenses, although taxes levied for their support have been collected and are being retained by collecting officials. For instance, the board of education of Chicago regularly spends about \$800,000.00 a year interest on borrowed money, paying as much as 5 per cent interest, while at the same time the county treasurer of Cook county is keeping tax money deposited for a much smaller rate of interest, the earnings of Cook county from this source amounting to as much as \$400,000.00 annually. If the board of education could receive its share of Cook county tax money earlier it would save a considerable amount of interest. This same situation, to a greater or lesser extent, prevails in other parts of the state.

To Secure Interest "Business sagacity demands that idle public funds be kept on deposit at agreed rates of interest, which interest when received shall become a part of such funds. Nevertheless, this is not always done at the present, and there is no law requiring that it shall always be done. The business men of the state, speaking through their chambers of commerce, have now authorized the Illinois chamber of commerce to ask that it shall be done. We will place this request before the fifty-fourth general assembly."
