TWO DIE AS RESULT OF ACCIDENTS HERE

MAN AND BOY ARE VICTIMS

Hugh Kelly Struck by Electric Car Sunday Night; Highwood Child Hit by Auto; Inquests Held

Two fatal accidents, one by rail and the other by automobile, occurred in Highland Park and vicinity within the last week, the victim of the former being Hugh Kelly, 50, a gardener for W. J. Louderback, 311 Moraine road, and of the other a little boy, Thomas George Curley, seven, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Curley, Prairie avenue, Highwood.

Kelly, according to testimony at an inquest held at the H. M. Prior company's office on Monday, was struck Sunday evening at the Elm street crossing by a North Shore line local car, northward bound. The gates were down as Kelly approached from the east, but he appeared to have failed to notice this fact or that a train was near and walked almost directly in front of the car.

Lived About Two Hours The car, which did not have a stop at Elm place, as there were no passengers to leave or take aboard, was running about 20 to 25 miles an hour, according to the statement of the conductor at the inquest. It was stopped immediately after striking the man, and he was rushed to the Highland Park hospital, where it was found that he had suffered a bad (Continued on page 12)

LOUISVILLE MINISTER SPEAKS HERE DEC. 14

On Christian Education Day, as Part of The Presbyterian College Drive

Christian education day will be observed by the Presbyterians of Highland Park with special services on Sunday, Dec. 14. Dr. Thomas J. Graham of Louisville, Ky., one of the leading ministers of the church will speak. Dr. Graham has been addressing the larger congregations throughout the state and has completed a survey of educational conditions in Iowa and Illinois. He will speak on "Christian Education."

The services will be a part of the Lake county movement for Lake Forest college and five other Presbyterian educational institutions in Illinois. There will be no solicitation of funds at the services, however. Dr. O. W. An executive committee, composed of Lake Forest residents, has set a goal of \$100,000 as that city's part in the campaign. A half million dollars will come to the college from the state at large. Other institutions in the \$9,000,000 campaign are: James Milliken University, Blackburn College, Illinois College, Lincoln College and the Presbyterian student work at the University of Illinois.

DARROW TALKS ON CRIME AND PENALTY

AT WOMAN'S CLUB HERE

Noted Lawyer of Leopold-Loeb Case Speaks; Gives His Views From His Long Experience

The annual evening meeting of the Highland Park Woman's club, an open meeting, to which husbands and friends of the membership were welcome, was held on Tuesday evening, Dec. 2nd.

The speaker, Mr. Clarence Darrow, addressed his audience on "Crime and Punishment," a subject which a thoughtful public is at present much concerned with as it has become a more and more threatening problem in the life of our great cities, in some cases touching our lives rather closely.

Mr. Darrow's views on this subject ought to be worth something as a result of a long life of experience and study of the tragic cases that have been brought to his attention in his capacity as criminal lawyer. He presented his subject from the point of the humanitarian, with the earnest desire to alter the cruel conditions inheritance and environment of these unfortunate individuals who grow up to menace society.

He dealt with the causes for crime as arising in bad conditions of insistence and environment and insisted upon preventive measures as the only hope of coping with the situation. He said, "that if as much money were spent on bettering the life conditions and for suitable education of these groups as is spent on hunting them down to bring them to punishment, that we would be rid of a huge per cent of the crime now committed."

Speaking of Punishment, Mr. Darrow said that he did not believe in commuting a sentence. He thought that these misfits in society should be permanently cared for as sick people apart from their fellow men, and that the caretakers and officers in charge should be expressly trained and intelligently fit to care for their patients. If it was demonstrated that one could again adjust himself to life in the world, the unfortunate should be under no circumstances be sent back to his old environment, subject again to the same influences which in all probability would lead him to do wrong again.

He appealed to society to help these individuals to live under different conditions at this crisis if there was to be any hope of avoiding a repetition of offenses. Mr. Darrow sounded a note of pessimism in pointing out to his audience the selfishness of mankind that hinders him from extending the real help to this unfortunate group that is in our midst. He thinks that men are more hungry for the punishment than the prevention of crime. His discussion sent his audience away in a sober and thoughtful mood.

COUNCIL AND BOARD SESSIONS ARE HELD

ASK ST. JOHNS PAVING BIDS

To Be Received Jan. 9 for Section of This Street Between Laurel and Sheridan Rd.; Other Business

At the regular session of the city council, and the board of local improvements, held last Friday evening, the board adopted a resolution providing for advertising for bids for the construction of a reinforced concrete paving in St. Johns avenue, from Laurel avenue to Sheridan road, to be known as Special Assessment No. 288. Bids will be received at 5:15 o'clock Friday evening, January 9, 1925.

During the council session Commissioner Gourley presented bills and payrolls covering the period from Oct. 15 to Nov. 15 and moved approval. The bills total \$10548.80. The report was approved and the bills and payrolls allowed and ordered paid. On motion of Commissioner Gourley bill of Contractor E. E. Farmer for \$117 for construction of manhole at the corner of First street and Laurel avenue was approved for payment as per recommendation of the engineer. A communication from Carleton Moseley regarding a 12 inch cast iron pipe constructed along Edgewood road was placed on file.

Approval and acceptance was accorded the plat of Highland Park Terrace subdivision of part of N. E. quarter of S. W. quarter of Section 27-43-12.

Officials present at this session were Commissioners Cheney, Preston and Gourley. At the beginning of the session the local improvement board, Commissioner Cheney, on motion of Commissioner Preston, was elected acting president of the board, in the absence of Mayor Hastings.

Two reports were submitted by Engineer James L. Frye, one certifying that the Fitzgerald Construction company, engaged in building the highway bridge on Sheridan road, Special assessment No. 261, was entitled to payment of \$5,500, and the other certifying that \$4,500 was due this company. Both were allowed, on motions of members Gourley and Preston, respectively.

Payment on Contract Engineers Windes & Marsh presented estimate No. 4 for contractors, for the Charles M. Porter company, for the materials and labor on the sewer system, the amount reported due being \$11,600. This sum, plus motion of member Gourley, was allowed.

On motion of Mr. Preston the Charles M. Porter company was allowed payment of \$123.72, representing balance retained to cover maintenance charges, according to the engineer's recommendation.

Contractor Douglas McNeill was allowed payment of \$4,123, balance retained to cover maintenance on water main which he constructed on Glencoe avenue, and also \$39.64, balance retained for the same purpose on the contract for the Maple avenue water main.
