URGES REMOVAL OF RIVER POLLUTION

TO PROTECT GAME FISH

Sanitary Engineer Favors Legislation to Clear Streams of Sewage and Similar Impurities

Harry E. Ferguson, chief sanitary engineer of the department of public health, in an address at a recent meeting of the Federated sportsmen urged the sportsmen to work for better laws for the prevention and removal of pollution in the streams and rivers of Illinois.

Mr. Ferguson after showing that considerable progress had been made in the matter of stream sanitation and surveys and the establishment of sewage-treatment plants at various cities, explained that there was a lamentable lack of present pollution laws and consequently in enforcement because of a division of activity and authority among several departments of the state government. One department is interested only in the principal waterways, one in the purity of water supplies and bathing beaches and nuisances caused by odors etc., from polluted streams, and another in the effect upon fish life and also at times on cattle.

Urge Legislation
It was the consensus of opinion of the sportsmen that the next general assembly should be asked to pass necessary legislation to make unlawful the objectionable pollution of all streams and lakes in Illinois and to concentrate in one officer or department the study of stream sanitation and pollution and full authority to enforce these much needed anti-pollution laws.

Some of the cities that have made or are making marked progress in this great work of removing pollution from our streams and lakes are: Sandwich, Highland Park, Elgin, Downers Grove, Springfield, Champaign, Urbana, Decatur, McHenry, Chicago Heights, Mattoon and Galesburg.

Clean Up Sangamon
On November 4 the citizens of Springfield voted overwhelmingly for authorization of a million and a half dollar bond issue and special tax for installation of a complete system of intercepting sewers and sewage-treatment plants which when completed will prevent the entrance of all objectionable pollution into the Sangamon river at this point. With the completion of the plants at Decatur and Springfield the Sangamon river will again be filled with fish as it was years ago. The sportsmen of Springfield played an important part in putting over this project and their success should be an inspiration to sportsmen and public-minded citizens all over the state to carry on until Illinois once more stands near the top of the list of states of clean rivers which mean protection to our public water supplies and bathing places, removal of foul odors and of especial importance to sportsmen a plentiful supply of fish and game.

ANNOUNCE REDUCTION IN PRICES OF FORDS

The reduction in prices announced by the Ford Motor Company becoming effective Dec. 2 will save over three-quarters of a million dollars to Ford car buyers during the month of December alone, officials of the company predict. That this amount will be left to the car buyers to spend on holiday gifts and other things is based on a conservative estimate of December sales.

The largest cut in the Ford list was that of \$25 in the price of the Fordor sedan, one of the most attractive Ford closed cars and one which is a favorite for family use.

Prices on other Ford types were also reduced bringing all of them to the lowest price level in the history of the company.

LAKE FOREST CHIEF OF POLICE RESIGNS

James Gordon to Quit Dec. 31 After Many Years of Service

James Gordon, chief of police at Lake Forest, has filed his resignation to take effect Dec. 31. He plans to make an extended tour of the Bermuda Islands and other points in the West Indies after which he will spend the winter in Florida. Chief Gordon has been head of the police department in Lake Forest for about 20 years and has an enviable reputation as a police officer. He has a host of friends on the North Shore who wish him well.

UNFINISHED HOUSE AT HIGHWOOD BURNS

Fire of Unknown Cause Badly Damages It Early Tuesday Evening

Fire of unknown cause badly damaged the uncompleted two-story house being erected on High street, Highwood, by Dominik Berube, Tuesday evening. The roof and second story were badly burned and the building is a wreck. The flames had gained a good headway when discovered shortly after six o'clock Tuesday evening. The owner was out of town, it was reported. The Highwood firemen assisted by the Port Sheridan department soon had the fire under control. The loss is said to be covered by insurance.

MANY AUTO OWNERS WANT SAME NUMBERS

In Renewing Licenses Ask For Reassignment; Impossible After December 1

Never before have requests for reassignment of automobile license numbers been so heavy as they are this year, Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson stated today. In former years applications for re-assignments were for four figures or less.

"This year the requests run from number 1 to 1,000,000," Mr. Emmerson said, "and practically every number under 10,000 has been re-assigned to the former holder, while there are thousands of letters on my desk asking for a number of from two to four figures."

"I have often wished there was some way in which low numbers could be manufactured, for I would need about 10,000 numbers below 1,000 to supply all of the requests that are received. The realization of the desirability of low numbers is very evident in the fact that many holders who are releasing their numbers attempt to 'will' them or convey them by 'warranty deed' to a friend."

"This, of course, is impossible as the law provides that if the holder of a number does not apply for re-assignment on or before December 1, that number is open and is to be placed by the Secretary of State."

A prominent banker in Illinois who held a desirable four figure number and who wished to release it, being aware of the great demand for such numbers mailed a form letter to many residents over the State in which he stated:

"Subject to prior acceptance, I will undertake to have the transfer made of this number for use on your car for \$25. No payment to be made to me until transfer is made."

"Wire or write me at once if you wish to accept this offer. Numbers as low as this are hard to obtain now."

The banker of course lost all right to his number when he failed to apply on or before December 1 for its re-assignment, and the number was assigned in the regular way by Secretary Emmerson.
