


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Watch Plumbing Uncle Sam Cautions

Hoover Issues Standard Code Washington, D. C.—The Department of Commerce have approved a "people plumbing code" with the hope that may be adopted by states and muni for the protection of the public "fre tive and cheap material and impropinstallation." The code was prepar by a special committee appointed Secretary Hoover and headed by Will-iam C. Groeniger of Cleveland.
