DR. RACHEL YARROS
INTERESTING SPEAKER

Addresses Woman's Civic Club Wednesday on "Social Hygiene"; Talk Enjoyed

The Woman's Civic club of Ravinia, held their regular meeting at the Village house, Ravinia, Wednesday p. m., Dec. 10.

Dr. Rachel Yarros of Chicago was the speaker of the afternoon and she talked to a large and interested group of women on "Sex education, dealing with the training of children." Dr. Yarros is chairman and director of the social hygiene council of Chicago which is working continually for the betterment of social conditions from the standpoint of health and morals in wiping out social disease through safe and proper cures as well as education.

She is a recognized authority upon the subject and all its phases, which she has made her life work. She is a forceful, earnest speaker of strong moral convictions with which she deeply impresses her audience.

Dr. Yarros led up to her subject through several of its phases and in so doing, she called upon all society to face the facts in order to understand them and to deal with them intelligently.

She spoke of the tremendous strides made towards the eradication of social disease, which had been considered impossible, but which were accomplished in the army during the war. She also endorsed the Public Health institute in effecting proper cures. She also praised the work of the institutions for the feeble minded and subnormal who contribute so largely to the delinquent class which has proved that these cases can be cured through proper education.

For the greatest protection of the family she emphasized the need for the best instruction to our children at home in the matter of sex, beginning at an early age with simple lessons in physiology which every mother can teach, as well as thorough illustrations in nature.

For the adolescent stage of development the "building up period," between the ages of 12 and 20 she advised that the restless energy of youth at this time be directed into the most idealistic channels; music, the best literature, art, athletics and study; and that the recreation be spent under the finest influences.

In her earnest desire to have her message count for something permanent and her work carried on, Dr. Yarros suggested the organization of child study classes for mothers, for mutual helpfulness and benefit in dealing with the problems that confront every mother.

Many of these have already been organized under her direction and guidance to which she generously contributes her time and knowledge. After the meeting the annual Christmas donations by club members of food, clothing and toys, were packed sent to the Chicago commons.

House Has a History

The house described above was built over 50 years ago and was located on the lot now occupied by the barber shop just west of the post office on Central avenue and was occupied by John Finney's father, later by a man by the name of Mr. Apple, then by Silas Brand and after him by Patrick Dooley, father of our present day Dooleys. Then it was purchased by John Finney and moved to 328 North Sheridan road on the lot now occupied by Mrs. Schumann's residence. There it was remodeled and additions built to it. Later it was purchased by P. A. Montgomery who moved it to its present location and later was bought by Mr. Decker.

It has been remodeled and added to several times, so while the old cottage is an old Highland Park landmark, the present day house is modern in quite a number of respects.

At the time it was built, there were only one or two other houses on Central avenue west of the tracks.


There were two other large prairie fires which were extinguished without damage to property.

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
