MRS. MORGAN SPEAKS TO AUXILIARY MEMBERS

At District Meeting Dec. 11; Is Largely Attended; North Shore Towns Represented

The district meeting of the Legion auxiliary on Thursday afternoon, Dec. 11th at the home of Mrs. Henry E. Mason, president of the Highland Park unit was a large and enthusiastic one. Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Waukegan and Libertyville were represented as well as Highland Park. Mrs. Henry Rhode of Lake Forest, the district president, presided and in a graceful speech presented Mrs. W. H. Morgan, vice president of the national board of the American Legion auxiliary and the speaker of the afternoon.

Mrs. Morgan proved not only a forceful and eloquent speaker but possessed such a charming personality it is no wonder that she has become a power and a leader in the national organization. She spoke of the tremendous growth of the Legion auxiliary and said there were approximately 1500 units attached to Legion posts in all parts of the world, including one in Alaska, one in Paris, 2 in Hawaii and one each in Cuba and Panama. These units mean a large enrollment of wives, mothers, daughters and sisters of ex-service men and she said that every woman eligible to it should be proud to be an auxiliary to a legion who had fought so nobly for justice and for freedom. Mrs. Morgan said the auxiliary units aim to contribute to the success of Legion activities and the civic and humanitarian enterprises of the posts to which they are attached and the accomplishment in which the American Legion may take most justifiable pride is its service rendered to all ex-service men and women and especially to the sick and disabled veterans and their dependents. She stressed the work undertaken at present to provide Legion homes for the orphans of our war heroes and said it was disgraceful that some hundreds of these children were in public institutions. Mrs. Morgan also said the Legion Auxiliary is looking after ten homes for disabled women war workers as well as 50 war nurses in tubercular sanitariums in the West. Mrs. Herbert Smith sang a group of songs, delightfully as usual, accompanied by Mrs. Jas. Watson. During the social hour plans were made for a Christmas party at Great Lakes and the gift of a victrola to the boys.

W. H. SCHENDORF SELLS 120 ACRES TO A. D. LASKER

\$120,000 Cash Deal Just Consummated; Land Lies One Mile Southwest of Everett

Mr. W. H. Schendorf has sold to Mr. A. D. Lasker, president of Lord and Thomas, and formerly head of the United States Shipping board, one hundred and twenty acres one-half mile south and one-quarter mile west of Everett on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, being in the Lake Forest district.

This is a part of the 360 acres now owned at this location by Mr. Schendorf and was formerly eight or nine farms. This particular 120-acre tract once belonged to Miller of Miller and Hart, the packers, on which he erected a beautiful set of paving brick barns of Old English architecture.

The sale was for an all cash consideration of \$120,000. Mr. Lasker was represented by Mayer, Mayer, Austin & Platt and Mr. Schendorf by Mr. Henry M. Hagan.

It is understood that Mr. Lasker has purchased 250 acres adjoining this tract and will erect thereon a beautiful residence and construct an 18-hole golf course. He contemplates spending one and one-half millions on this property.
