### HOLD MARION IN ERMINE ROBBERY

Bond of \$5,000 Required; Woman Held as Witness; Gown Recovered

Robert Marion, 1918 Birchwood ave. Rogers Park, was bound over to the grand jury last week before Justice Harry Hoyt on a charge of larceny growing out of the \$6,000 robbery staged at the Ermine Cleaners at Highwood.

His bonds were set at \$5,000 and he was returned to the county jail on a mittimus in default of bonds.

Evelyn Dinsmore, 22, of 4852 N. Magnolia street, Chicago, who had faced a charge of larceny through the acceptance of one of the dresses from the loot, was held as a material witness under a cash bond of \$300 while the larceny charge was dropped. States Attorney A. V. Smith, following a consultation with Attorney Reuel H. Grunewald, solicitor for Miss Dinsmore, agreed to drop the charge. The woman had made complete statements before the justice previous to this action.

The dress, a \$600 creation, the property of Mrs. Lucius P. Ordway, of Lake Forest, and a dress that had been worn through five dances with the Prince of Wales when he visited Chicago recently, was the one the woman had selected from the bundle of clothing that Marion is charged with having taken into her flat. This garment was found in the Capman cleaners on Magnolia street by Deputy Del Weale after the woman had confessed where it was.

Indication that the entire case would be dropped came today through a statement made by Marion. He stated that Shampay, one of the managers of Ermine cleaners, had told him Thursday that he had discovered that most of the loot had found its way back. Shampay is quoted as saying that he would not prosecute in case full restitution could be made. Marion stands ready, he says, to pay in full.

"I was drunk, as horned as an owl. Everything is just about as Weale said," Marion announced in the court.

### INSULL MEDALS ARE AWARDED THIS YEAR

Thirteen Insull medals for resuscitation by the prone pressure method have been awarded this year upon recommendation of the Accident Prevention committee of the N. E. L. A. Seven other recommendations are awaiting award of medals or approval by the executive committee of that association.

The Insull medal was established by Samuel Insull, chairman of the Public Service company, to stimulate interest and proficiency in the prone pressure method of resuscitating victims of electrical accidents.

The recipients of the medals awarded so far are residents of eight states, ranging from New Hampshire to Texas. They include one woman, Mrs. S. L. Stanley, wife of a Texas power and light company patrolman. Six of the medals were presented during the N. E. L. A. convention last May.

### SCIENCE BREAKING BARS TO EXPANSION

#### INDIVIDUALITY IS AIDED

Expert Says Whatever Man Controls Is Part of Personality; Has Some Queer Notions Also

"Civilization is the breaking down of natural barriers to the expansion of human individuality through the scientific control of energy," in the words of Dr. Edwin E. Slosson, editor of Science Service, Washington, D. C., in a talk at the University of Illinois.

Dr. Slosson went on to say that every educated man should be able to tell what caused the decline of the Roman Empire and to give a definition of civilization. He gave his own definition and then enumerated the limitations which he has overcome.

"The measure of personality is the amount of energy a man can master, was a lesson soon learned by mankind in his adoption of tools," stated Mr. Slosson. "The map pointer is an extended arm, the forceps, extended fingernails. Roller skates and bicycles are extended legs. The tool plus motive power is a machine and is part of the person so long as it remains in his control. The rollers that break up the wheat are artificial teeth and the stove is an artificial stomach.

"Money is another power of extending personality," the speaker continued. "When I want my garden spaded I aid my back by the means of a green back. I let my money sing for me when I put on a phonograph record and have Caruso sing as I would like to sing."

The limitations of the past have been overcome by artificial memory, Mr. Slosson explained, and the limitations of space by the telegraph, telephone and wireless. This was the first time in history, he showed, that a presidential candidate could talk directly to all his constituents without making a tour of the country and for the first time the world was able to listen to a political convention trying to choose a candidate.

#### Overcome Altitude

"Altitude has been one of the hardest limitations to overcome," the speaker went on, "but it has been successfully started and the late war was the first that was ever fought in three spaces, air, water and land. The common use of electricity has overcome the limitation of night and day and in the perfection of refrigeration, the limitations of heat and cold have been overcome."

Mark Twain said that everybody was always complaining about the weather but nobody every seemed to do anything about it. Mr. Slosson said that science was doing something about it. Through rapid transportation, refrigeration and improved methods of handling food, man could migrate between seasons or enjoy the foods of any season whenever he desired, he explained.

#### Greatest Achievement

The greatest achievement of man, said Mr. Slosson, was the destruction of limitation of disseminating knowledge. Today it is possible for a small sum to get a copy of any book published. If you have a real mission, for a sum not exceeding two hundred

dollars you can get it printed in book form and distributed to the world.

Dr. Slosson said that formerly it was thought that a pure democracy was impossible in a country of such a large extent as the United States, but since science has overcome space and time, it is possible for not only the inhabitants of a large country to speak, think and act alike but it is possible for the whole world to do so.

### NAME ENUMERATORS FOR FARM CENSUS

Several Appointed in Townships of Lake County; A Few Still To Be Listed

The Bureau of the Census, U. S. department of commerce, is taking a federal census of agriculture covering the year 1924. This survey will include all information regarding farmers, their crops, property, etc. and the actual field work begun on December 1, 1924, in certain localities.

Edward W. Koch, of Rockford, supervisor of the first district of Illinois, is naming enumerators all over the district to obtain the necessary information.

Up to the present time the following enumerators have been named for Lake county and now are engaged in visiting the various farmers in their own townships:

Antioch, Lake Villa and Newport townships—Alexander G. Hughes of Antioch.

Benton, Warren and Waukegan townships—Leroy J. Slocum of Wadsworth.

Cuba and Els townships—Peter Jensen of Lake Zurich.

Deerfield, Shields, Vernon and West Deerfield townships—Charles J. Herschberger of Prairie View.

No enumerator has as yet been named for the district taking in Avon, Grant and Wauconda townships. The same is true of the district including Fremont and Libertyville townships.

In some places Mr. Koch has experienced considerable difficulty in getting enumerators due chiefly to the low rate of compensation allowed, but as the appropriation provided by congress for this work is limited, 25 cents for each report is all that can be offered.

In some counties all of the districts are filled and the enumerators are at work, but in others there still are one or more vacancies.

### WOMEN VOTERS WANT WIDER RECOGNITION

The League of Women voters last week addressed a letter to the county supervisors, at the December term, requesting that the women of the county receive greater recognition at elections in the future.

The request was that more women be drawn to serve as members of boards of election at the various precincts of the county. Also that the street addresses of the judges and clerks of election be included in the list which the board prints annually in its proceedings.

The league stated that numerous requests had come to them for these addresses, and also that some complaint had been made because there were not more women on the election boards in the past.

The letter was signed by Mrs. Dee Ellen Dady, corresponding secretary of the league.

Congress has begun its final session in a cheerful mood, and the country also feels cheerful that it is getting through.
