Interesting Happenings Here & There In This Section Of North Shore and At County Seat

E. H. Clifford, secretary of the Waukegan and North Chicago chamber of commerce for the past four years will retire from that position on January 10th.

Erra M. Cannon, 75, a resident of Barrington for sixty-seven years, died suddenly last week at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Glen R. Hawley, with whom he had resided since the death of his wife. Death was due to heart trouble.

James Fraher, 633 South Sheridan road, Waukegan, was given a signal honor last week when the Illinois Bell Telephone company presented him with a gold star for having served the company for 25 years. The presentation was made in the Chicago offices of the company.

The supervisors last week voted an appropriation of \$2300 to the Farmers institute to enable that organization to promote a series of meetings in various parts of the county for the education of young people in agriculture work, and lectures on farming and dairying.

Persons residing outside of the corporate limits of Waukegan no longer will be able to get the city fire department to make runs to protect their property. This decision was made last week by the city council, following extensive arguments on the proposition.

The tallest flag pole in Lake county, given to the county by Gus Schleicher of the Genesee hotel and installed at the Lake County General hospital by the Public Service company, was presented to the board of supervisors last week and accepted by them. The board voted a resolution of thanks to Schleicher and the Public Service company.

Announcement was made last week that the Indiana inheritance tax against the estate of Delevan Smith of Lake Forest, Ill., former publisher of the Indianapolis News, had been fixed at \$8,966.

MOFFETT SEES AIR MAIL TO EUROPE

SHIPS LIKE SHENANDOAH TELLS RIVERS AND HARBORS CONGRESS THAT AIR POWER IS LIKELY TO DOMINATE MAN'S FUTURE

"One million letters from New York to London by rigid airship in three days. "Not a dream but a near prospect. "Seventy hours from New York to Peking by airship and the saving of interest on commercial thus carried paying for the trip.

Thus Rear Admiral Moffett declared to the current twentieth convention of the national rivers and harbors congress in Washington last week.

In three minutes Moffett had the delegates applauding; in five he had them feeling antiquated, for what they were their transportation medium—water—compared with his air? A back number.

With Dewey at Manila Rear Admiral William Edgar Moffett was with George Dewey in the Manila battle. Today he is chief of the navy's bureau of aeronautics. He is the prime saver of newspaper space in this country; would thoroughly enjoy dropping all "the's" and "a's" in the language from an airship at 7,000 feet altitude into the ocean where it is deepest. Travels light and compact, he is luggage or language.

Abrupt and curt, he talked practicalities to practical men about air service as a business as a business proposition. "Best means of transportation I ever used," said he. "Believe the public will be much pleased with it because rigid airships are not fair weather ships except when entering hangars or when near ground. Up high as comfortable and steady as a fish in water."

No Seasickness Here "For travellers they are more comfortable than ocean liners as there is no chance of seasickness, there being no appreciable motion. Plenty room and facilities on our Los Angeles and the impression she makes is very like Pullman, only much more room.

"Now consider this big economic saving! Rigid air ships need stand still very briefly between trips. They need not be in port more than very few hours for fueling and change of crew. Then off again! I believe them practical for commercial purposes now. Freight carried will have to be light, but the single item of interest on money transferred across Atlantic in three days would pay for a trip.

Can Triple Speed "Rigid airships can make three times the speed of surface ships. And our first field for this service is over the water, because on land we can't beat railroad service at sixty miles an hour owing to our mountains.

"Air transportation already has made the world five times smaller. It will be the essence and essential of civilization's future. With it you can go anywhere where there is air. With it our country is safe from invaders, for with this service you can see everything, and everything we can see we can destroy.

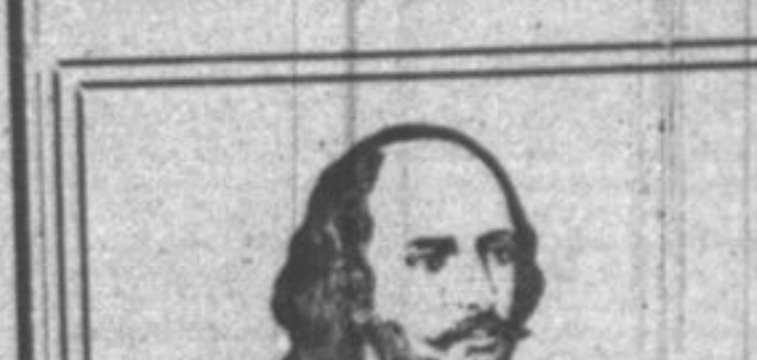
