### NEW DESIGN VOTED FOR WAR MEMORIAL

so the tablets carrying these names were made of major importance in the design. These tablets are attached to plain, simple flanks of granite on either side of the monument. Between them stands a figure of a "Peace Angel" some eight feet in height. This figure is not only a symbol of peace but it is the guardian that stands protector of the names inscribed.

"The figure holds a sword in vertical position with both hands, but with the point downwards. The handle of the sword forms a blazing torch which signifies that the weapon was one used for accomplishment in the warfare for ideals, the hilt forming a cross which speaks for the righteousness of the combat.

Bears Inscription  
"Over the head of the figure carved in stone are the words, 'Peace by Victory.' This inscription was placed over the head of the Peace Angel with a definite intent that all who looked on this figure should realize that the peace we enjoy is a noble peace, one that was obtained for us through the sacrifice and noble victory of the men who fought and that it was in no way a peace of compromise, obtained by methods that would bring a blush of shame to our children.

Honors Dead Heroes  
"The other face of the monument, the one to the east, is devoted entirely to the seven citizens of Highland Park who lost their lives in the war. In a medallion at the top is a winged male figure carrying a torch and palm, flying over crosses such as those at Flanders Field. On this face, as on the other, a band of rich design runs down the center of the spaces of granite. Each flank of this monument, flanked by plain, quiet spaces bears part of the inscription, 'Forget not Those Who Died in War That You Might Live in Peace.'

"About midway up the central panel an urn is carved in granite which will hold ivy and flowers in the summer, and evergreens during the winter. Directly above this the seven Gold Star names will be placed, with the idea that something of new life be continually growing below them to keep their memory alive.

"The design that occurs in the monument has as its motif the blade of the sword and a conventionalized flame.

"This, in short, gives the general idea back of the monument. The steps on which it rests are designated by carving to represent the three divisions of the service, Land, Air, and Sea."

Approached From Any Direction  
"The monument has been so designed that it can be approached from any direction. There is no front or back but rather two faces. The west face carries the idea of the peace we have had given us with the names of those who helped secure it for us. The east face, the face that looks to the rising sun and the birth of a new day, is to be a special memorial to those who laid down their lives that a new day might dawn."

Ewell's Design Adopted  
At the conclusion of Mr. Ewell's talk question were asked and Mayor Hastings spoke strongly recommending the adoption of the proposed design for Highland Park.

The adoption of this design was voted upon and carried unanimously by those present. The chairman spoke of the necessity for every one doing all that this possible to raise the money as approximately twenty thousand dollars will be needed. \$10,500 has already been pledged which means that at least nine thousand more will have to be raised.

Too much cannot be said for the work of Mr. Ewell who is glad to give his services to the town he lives in. His design has been endorsed by Mr. Rudolph Ingerle, Mr. Frank C. Peyraud and Mr. Jens Jensen, all artists of distinction.

### SPAIN ABANDONS PHONE OWNERSHIP

Spain has followed the example of Italy and Greece in abandoning government ownership of telephones. King Alphonso recently signed a decree authorizing the execution of a contract for the construction and operation by private enterprises of a general telephone system throughout the country. This project has been undertaken by the National Telephone company of Spain, a corporation recently organized to take over, extend and improve the telephone systems owned by the Spanish government and by private companies in various parts of Alfonso's kingdom. The company is being financed largely with capital supplied through various Spanish banks, and is encouraging the manufacture of telephone apparatus in Spain. Technical and financial advice and assistance are being supplied by American interests, and

an extensive program of telephone expansion and development has been undertaken.

In turning to private enterprise for the progressive upbuilding of her telephone system, Spain is participating in a more or less general European movement away from government ownership. Greece has recently granted a concession to British interests for an up-to-date telephone system to supplant her government-owned telephones. Italy is considering bids from private companies for the purchase of her state telephone system. Poland has turned over her publicly-owned telephone facilities in several cities to a private company, in which the Polish government has only a minority interest. Even Germany, although retaining the ownership of her national systems of electrical communication, is reported to be considering plans for securing their operation along certain corporate lines.

### FURNACE AND SUN AIDS TO MORALITY

Warmth and Light in America Cause for Gratefulness, Says Critic

"Americans should be forever grateful for two things," writes William Lyon Phelps in the Christmas Scribner's Magazine: "the sunshine without and the furnace within. 'Tis not we never get foreign credit for our glorious sky. For centuries British writers have celebrated the beauty of Italian sunshine, because that was the only kind they knew. As a matter of fact, the sky over Florence is not a shade more blue than the sky over Bridgeport. But as we have it so often, we forget what a blessing it is. I once asked a Scotsman who had emigrated to America what was the chief thing in the new country which impressed him by its difference: 'The blue sky.' Then he told me that during his twenty-five years in Scotland he had never seen one day without clouds.

"On the streets of London, you can tell an American from an Englishman by looking at his feet. The American wears the thin low shoes he brought from home; the Englishman wears heavy high laced shoes—he calls them boots—with soles an inch thick. He has to.

"In the year 1698 the Reverend Jeremy Collier made his famous attack on the immorality and profaneness of the English stage. All the dramatists retorted angrily except Dryden, who owned up, like the honest man he was. Various explanations and excuses were offered by the others; but the most original was that given by William Congreve. This accomplished gentleman blamed it all on the weather. He said that in countries warmed by sunshine it was not necessary to have a racy literature; but in England the climate was so depressing that the dramatists were in duty bound to furnish any means of entertainment that would help spectators to forget their environment. This is the only occasion, so far as I know, where the weather has been used as an excuse for immoral plays."
