GOOD RESULTS OF GOLDEN RULE PLAN IN TWENTY-THREE LANDS

Fine Reports of Observance of Annual Sunday Devoted to Near East Relief and Its Orphans

Reports of the observance of Golden Rule Sunday on December 7th are "most gratifying," according to a statement issued by the national executive committee of the Near East relief. As to the financial result, returns are not yet available. The statement adds: "The organization must obviously have a great deal more money than can be expected from Golden Rule Sunday, but it needs every cent that can be obtained in that way, and it needs a great deal besides. There are thousands of regular monthly subscribers to its funds, but persons who are not giving regularly or frequently are expected to send in contributions ranging from one to a thousand dollars each during the next fortnight as the result of Golden Rule Day."

In 23 Countries Cablegrams have been received from twenty-three foreign countries chronicling the success of the observance there. The new French Ambassador to America, M. Emile Daeschner, who is a member of the French committee, sent the following message from Paris: "American, French and international philanthropy will continue the movement on behalf of the refugee orphans of the Near East. We must continue to furnish the necessities of life until better days come. The cooperation of President Coolidge and Ambassador Jusserand indicate the wide following which the Golden Rule movement has. In view of my approaching residence in America I am happy to assure you that this international work has my personal sympathy and I am confident its world appeal will meet with greatest success."

Archbishop Cables The archbishop of Canterbury cabled: "We have impressed upon everyone in England the great cause in the Near East which Golden Rule day has so ably promoted. This relief work is one of our primary duties." A cablegram from Geneva says: "Golden Rule day universally observed in Switzerland." Mr. Charles V. Vickery, general secretary of the Near East relief, said in summing up the results of the observance: "This idea of eating

refugee rations with the children to whom the day is dedicated embodies the spirit of sacrifice in which the whole world has celebrated this Golden Rule Sunday. The need for continuation of relief in the Near East is only too apparent to those of us who have recently been over the ground. The practical application of the golden rule idea will mean, I hope, aid for thousands of destitute children. It will mean, I hope, the continuation of their faith and hope in America.

Peculiar Meaning "The observance of the day also had a peculiar meaning for the American people. In an age which is given over to luxury in our own country such as no other age has been, we need this day, that we may realize how the other half of the world lives. We need it for the purpose of enlarging our sympathies and expressing the calm friendliness and human sympathy which is the real spirit of America toward the world."
