SURVEY SHOWS TAX RATES IN SCHOOLS

Lake County Shown To Have Good System of Setting Tuition Fee

A survey of tax rates and tuition charges in the non-high school districts of the state shows that Lake county is among those that have high rates of taxation, but that the average tuition is kept fairly low on account of well organized school bodies.

A bulletin received by T. Arthur Simpson, county superintendent of schools, from the state headquarters, shows that the school tax rate for Lake county is .55 and that the average tuition cost is \$150.

Boone county has a rate of 2 cents on a hundred dollars, but its average tuition is \$180.

Explains Rates

Lake county's tax rate is fairly high because most of the other taxes are high also and naturally bring up the school tax. There are more non-high school districts in this county than in others, Mr. Simpson said, because it has been organized in order to prevent a great deal of overlapping.

In many counties downstate, there are more high schools than can be accommodated. This results in a great deal of expense as schools have to be operated without a sufficient number of students in them.

The state bulletin shows that 22 non-high school districts are levying to the limit fixed by the law. The limit is 66 cents on a hundred dollars. Ten other districts are near the limit.

Twenty districts have made an effort to limit the tuition rate and fix it at from \$90 to \$250. This has resulted in a great deal of friction and does not look as though it will succeed.
