ILLINOIS WINNINGS AT LIVESTOCK SHOW

STATE GETS FIFTY FIRSTS

List of the Many Prize Winners in Different Parts of the Country in Various Classes

Illinois fared exceedingly well at the International Live Stock Grain and Hay show at Chicago recently, carrying off fifty firsts in the various departments. The show was the most successful event of its kind, the horse and cattle exhibits and the corn and oats showing exceeding that of any of the 25 years of the exposition. The hay display, too, was exceptionally fine this year and the winning bale of alfalfa, raised by A. E. Jewett, Jr. of Mason, Michigan, was purchased by the Blue Valley Creamery institute of Chicago to demonstrate to the average farmer the possibilities of the crop.

University Wins Honors

The University of Illinois took the highest honors in the collegiate livestock judging contest by teams with a score of 1126 in hogs. The champion ram in breeding oxfords and the champion barrow in fat Poland Chinas were both entries of the state school. Alvin L. Helms, Belleville, had the best pen of three lambs, while the grand champion bull in breeding red polled was shown by J. W. Larabee & Sons, of Earlville. The champion wether in fat oxfords was claimed by W. J. Hampton, Champaign, while the champion barrow and the champion pen of barrows in fat Tamworths were products of the B. F. Harris farms at Seymour.

Fat Shorthorns

The champion steer in fat shorthorns title was bestowed on Derelict Laddie, owned by Buchanan & England, of Bridgeport, and John Hubly, Mason City, won the highest honors for two-year-olds in carloads of cattle for the Northwest district. J. M. Imboden, Decatur, was the winner in the same class for the Southwest district, and J. W. Frazier, Charleston, was awarded the ribbon on yearlings and R. E. Balch, Lerna, on two year olds for the Southern district. Ed P. Hall, of Mechanicsburg, won the two year olds in the corn belt district and also in yearlings, in champion two-year olds, in champion yearlings, the grand championship, two year olds in Aberdeen-Angus special, the yearlings in the same grade and then the grand championship. The Shorthorn association special on yearlings and the grand championship went to Hubly, while Frazier won the Here-

ford special in yearlings and Imboden in two year olds.

Feeder Carloads
C. M. Baum, Indianapolis, was most successful in carloads of feeder cattle for the Southwest district, M. J. Ranney, Casenovia, in the 150-200 pound class in carloads of swine, and Homer J. Waters, Dawson, in the 300-350 class. The grand champion bull in breeding polled shorthorns was the entry of the Laemon stock farm at Hoopston, and the grand champion boar in breeding Poland China was an Allerton farm product. The letter farm, located at Monticello, also took the highest award for the grand champion sow in breeding Poland China. The B. F. Harris farms carried off the grand champion boar in breeding Tamworths as well as the grand champion sow.

Other Awards
The Institute of American Meat Packers' awards follow: Roland Dyle, on carloads of Rambouillet; J. H. Nickelsen & Sons, Arenzville; Berkshires; Elmer Zark, Lanark; Duroc Jerseys; W. W. Crabb, Delevan; Chester Whites and Allerton farms, spotted Poland Chinas. Geo. McDohald, of Springfield, won the junior feeding contest in shorthorns, Dudley Armstrong, M-mouth, in Herefords, Alvin L. Helms, Belleville, in Southdowns and Forest Longfellow, Christian, in Cotswolds.

W. W. Rothgeb, of Milford, won first in the 10 ear white dent corn for region 3; Edwin W. Conlee, of Lowder, in the same class for region 4; J. E. Mummert, Astoria, in yellow for the same class and region and the sweepstakes in yellow for region 4, while Harnie Ruth, also of Astoria, was the single ear winner for the region and also the sweepstakes. Dorothy Heckman, Cerro Gordo, was the junior yellow dent winner for region 4, and Malcolm Rothgeb for region 3. Charles Fuller, of Warren won in oats for regions 3 and 7 and J. V. Gooden, Lowder, in regions 4 and 8. The sweepstakes for the best soybean sample were carried off by Chester R. Boland, of Paris.

PRINCETON CLUB WILL GIVE PLAY IN CHICAGO

Dec. 29 Is Date; Will Also Give "The Scarlet Coat" At Evanston, Dec. 30

The Triangle Club of Princeton University will present its 42nd annual production, "The Scarlet Coat," an original musical drama in Chicago at the Eighth Street Theatre on the afternoon and evening of Monday, December 29, and also in Evanston at the Evanston Country Club on Tuesday evening, December 30. Every feature of the production, including the writing of the play, dialogue, music and lyrics, the designing of the

sets and costumes, and the directing of lighting effects, is the work of Princeton students, who also fill all the parts in the cast, chorus and orchestra.

Sent for all three performances are to be reserved. J. Russell Forgan, of the National City Bank, 105 South Dearborn street, is in charge of the Chicago performances; while tickets to the Evanston performance Sherman, 329 Judson avenue, Evanston, are being handled by Robert T. Ston.

Organized in 1882 as the Princeton Dramatic Club, early efforts were devoted to the presentation of standard comedies. Both Tarkington, however, assumed the management in 1893, adopted the present name, and wrote the first original musical comedy produced by the club. Cyrus H. McCormick, Jr. was the author of the play produced during his last year at Princeton.

EXPERT DISCUSSES SCIENCE OF WARFARE
Study of Atoms to Make Possible More Destructive Means of Fighting

The study of atoms, molecules, electrons and other infinitesimal bodies to determine the action of nature to perfect the science of warfare so that in future conflicts entire cities can be blown to atoms was detailed recently by Carl Pfantstiel, Waubanagon manufacturer, before a Waubanagon audience.

At a recent convention in Washington which Mr. Pfantstiel attended, scientists and chemists who are engaged in perfecting modern death dealing inventions which could be used in case of war, it is shown that trench warfare would be a thing of the past in the next great conflict. Explosives have been perfected that are so powerful a small quantity dropped upon the city of Chicago or New York would completely destroy them, Mr. Pfantstiel said.

The study of the action of nature upon the most minute subjects, such as electrons and atoms has furnished science with many object lessons which have aided the scientists in perfecting their death-dealing inventions. Chemistry will furnish the major part of the weapons of destruction. Mr. Pfantstiel also explained his theory of the radio wave, which he claims is the controlling force in broadcasting, rather than the radio wave, as contended by other leaders in radio.
