GYMNASIUM CLASSES AT HIGH SCHOOL

May Be Resumed if Sufficient Demand; See Arthur Olson at Garnett's

The gymnasium classes for men and women at the High school were discontinued by action of the board of education when it was reported that there were only 10 bona fide members in the women's classes and 15 in the men's.

In previous years there have been from eighty to a hundred members; and the classes were started this year with no thought that the former number would not be reached again, especially since many requests for the service had come in advance. Several of those who joined the classes are now greatly disappointed because they have been discontinued. A charge of three dollars was made for the winter months, this money to be used to pay the two instructors and the extra janitor service entailed.

If there is a considerable demand for the classes after Christmas for the months of January, February, and March, they may be reorganized. Eighty new members at two dollars each will meet the cost and warrant the opening of the gymnasium. Classes will not be organized, however, until this number of paid members has been secured.

The classes are held on Monday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30. They include gymnastic exercises, games, and swimming.

Mr. Arthur Olson of Garnett's, Highland Park, is endeavoring to raise the required number. Those interested should communicate with him.

The code was prepared by a special committee appointed by Secretary Hoover and headed by William C. Groeniger of Cleveland.
