24. Plans for new Masonic temple displayed at lodge meeting. Charles Rubens' residence damaged by fire. John L. Rothacker resigns as coach at high school to take effect at end of school year. Michael A. Farmer accidentally killed. George Hock decides to sell out grocery business. Charles W. Church, former resident, died in Chicago.

1. Semi-Centennial celebration of Trinity Church to be held May 3. Swedish M. E. Church, Highwood, celebrates 20th anniversary. Purdy's Sport Shop opens in new location. Mrs. Martha Underhill died. Little son of Oscar Freberg has narrow escape from drowning in well.

8. Elm Place Auditorium opened with Chicago Civic Orchestra directed by Frederick Stock. More than half-million improvements recorded in city in four months. Charles H. Hankey died. North Shore line erecting new freight train near Northbrook. D.A.R. Week.

22. City council plans to co-operate in construction of new Skokie Valley road. Deerfield Men's Club elects officers. Mrs. Anna Edwards, Mr. and Mrs. Archie Abercrombie and John P. White injured when auto hits a freight train near Westbrook. D.A.R. planning purchase of new city flagstaff. Sebastian Stipe died. Dr. E. W. Fritsch's residence burglarized.

29. Sidney B. Cabn died suddenly. Death of Harry Evans. Charles Freberg died. O. G. St. Peter sells interest in Reliable laundry. Annual meeting of Lake County Federation of Bankers at Moraine hotel. Adelia May Reynolds died. Allen Benson, aged 8, injured when struck by auto while riding bicycle. Little Joe Cameron hurt at Highwood by auto.

JUNE

5. Business men decided to celebrate Highland Park Day Aug 13. Olivia MacCreedy died. Begin work of razing old Masonic Temple building preparatory to erection of new temple. Plan opening of public playground July 1. Annual musical festival at Elm Place school.

12. Irving Stieglitz died. Mrs. E. M. Umback died at Evanston. Mrs. George T. Pritchard died. Boyer

Memorial window in Trinity church to be dedicated June 15. Infant son of Hugo W. Larson died. Public and high schools' closing exercises held.

19. Miss Elizabeth Boynton and George H. Thornton married. Miss Elizabeth Page and Howard L. Wynegar to wed June 21. Miss Ada C. Fritsch bride of Fred C. Henning. Miss Henrietta M. Laing and George J. Artus married. Miss Margaret Sedgwick and Norman E. Bengston wed. O. G. St. Peter buys cleaning business in Waukegan. Mrs. Caroline Smith died. Formal dedication of new hospital buildings.

26. Ravinia season opened. Vacation Bible school begun. Elks planning remodeling of their building. Ground broken for new Masonic Temple. City council adopts budget for year. West Deerfield divided into two voting precincts. Fourth fireman added to regular forces at Station. Royal Arcanum has 47th anniversary.

JULY

3. George Merryweather died suddenly. Highland Park Day committee chairmen appointed. Fourth of July celebration under auspices of Legion post planned. Direct telephone wire to Deerfield established.

10. New assembly hall for high school and purchase of site for supplemental school at Lake Forest planned, and question of bond issue to be voted on July 22. Charles H. Eckhardt died in Cincinnati.

17. Numerous additional civic improvements planned by city council. Many fine features announced for Highland Park Day. Legion Auxiliary elects. Dorothy Purdy, aged 8, injured when struck by truck. William A. Reay elected director of the Highland Park State Bank. High school to reopen Sept. 8. Skokie ditch work reported progressing well.

24. Ravinia season delights music lovers, despite rainy weather. Proposition for bond issue for high school assembly hall and purchase of site at Lake Forest for supplemental school later carried by large majority. Annual report of local post of office shows urgent need of permanent building. William B. Lewis died on trip to Yellowstone National Park. Mrs. John Gourley injured in auto accident. Elks baseball team have a winning season.

31. Carl Anderson accidentally drowned. Many building permits issued here chiefly for smaller improvements. Andrew Johnson died at hospital. Hill laundry damaged by fire. Corner stone of new Masonic temple laid.

AUGUST

7. Heavy rainstorm causes damage in city and country. St. Johns avenue paving ordinance passed. Civic Music association reorganized. Mrs. M. J. Hardacre died. Mrs. Ida Miller died in California.

14. Ft. Sheridan-Sacred Heart road opened. Lillian June Hancock, aged

7, of Plano, killed by auto while visiting at Deerfield. Highland Park day is great success; all records broken.

21. Joe Maurantino, track walker for North Shore Line killed by "live" wire here. Mystic Workers held first annual picnic. Moose plan Labor day celebration. Western Junior Golf tournament held at Briarcliff.

28. Elaborate memorial to war veterans here planned by Ossoli club and friends. Hospital benefit bridge party held at Moraine hotel. Masons have annual picnic. A. H. Merner and J. H. Stryker of Deerfield injured in auto accident. Highwood business men hold open meeting.

SEPTEMBER

4. Several additions to faculty of high school, including new coach, J. A. Peel. Rev. Father Gates died at Highwood. New front installed in Garnett's gent's furnishings store. Rev. M. L. Thomas resigns pastorate of Deerfield Presbyterian Church to accept call to San Pedro, Calif.

11. Elks annual golf tournament held on Park District course. All schools re-open Sept. 8. Mrs. Mary Tipton sells restaurant to M. T. Lester. Musical entertainment at Elm place auditorium as benefit St. Johns Evangelical Church. Mrs. Ellen Holmes, former Highwood resident, died in New York state; burial at Lake Forest.

18. John Erickson, Jr., aged 4, struck and killed accidentally by auto. City council awards more contracts for civic improvements. Little daughter of Dr. Jacks hurt, at Highwood by auto. George Lenfesty died. Highland Park State Bank adds trust department. D. J. Brady, Highwood veteran soldier, died. Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Baldwin, Lake avenue, celebrated 50th wedding anniversary.

25. Contracts let by city for paving South Sheridan road and for new bridge on that thoroughfare. Rev. Francis J. Magner successor to Rev. Father Gates, deceased. Sergeant Oscar Bartz died. M. H. Gameley, Chicago insurance man, accidentally drowned in lake here. Mrs. Frank P. Hawkins reaches life's end. Mrs. Ella Leisenring died.

OCTOBER

2. City improvements plans for year estimated at over million dollars, with more next year. Action of county board in reversing its vote to build modern county farm buildings criticized here. Annual Y. W. Budget campaign opens. Woman's Club plans extensive activities for current year, its 25th. James H. Hart died at Asheville, N. C.

9. Y. W. Campaign splendid success. September building permits largest of any month in 1924. Watson building at Highwood damaged by fire. Fire drills held in local schools. Percy McLaughlin, Deerfield motor cop, badly injured.
