HIKE FROM CHICAGO HERE IN SIX HOURS

Rev. Frank Pitt and John Nason Hold Walking Record, Made Tuesday Morning
The Rev. Frank Pitt, pastor of the Highland Park Presbyterian Church, and John Nason, a student in Carleton college, whose home is in this city, are at least two local residents who, if necessary, can dispense with modern transportation facilities. They demonstrated this Tuesday by choice, when they walked from Chicago to Highland Park and made good time all the way. They started from the Northwestern station in Chicago at 9:00 a. m. and arrived at their homes on Prospect avenue at 3:12 p. m. Their actual walking time was six hours and three minutes as they took out a brief interval at Evanston for lunch. In this age of automobile and aircraft this is something of a feat in hiking not often equalled and seldom attempted. The distance is about 25 miles, and undoubtedly they hold the Chicago-Highland Park walking record.

The court at which this examination will be held convenes next March, in Waukegan. Any man or woman who is planning to take out second papers at that time will do well to attend this class and prepare for it. A small fee is charged for ten class lessons, and the work is very interesting and instructive. Class begins next Monday night at eight.

Mrs. Marc Law, chairman of the committee on English classes for foreign born and Mrs. Virgil Musser, chairman of the education committee of the Y. W. C. A., will speak briefly at the next meeting of the Business Men's association, held at Witten hall next Tuesday evening, on the work now being done in teaching English to foreign-born men and women residing in Highland Park. Mrs. Law, Mrs. Danley and Mrs. Musser visited Waukegan the last time the court met to examine applicants for citizenship, and the Examiner impressed upon them the need for just such classes and their importance in preparing foreigners to pass the examination.
