fore he realized anything was amiss. "Get up there," the bandit shouted to him above the rumbling of the train. Dickey complied. The bandit did not disarm him but commanded him to crawl toward the small closet at one end in which the baggage crew kept their coats and lunch boxes.

Turns on Robber
It was apparent that he meant to lock the two men in the closet. As they neared it, the robber commanded them to rise. Dickey thought he saw a chance to defeat the gunman and turned on him.

"Dickey had studied jiu-jitsu and tried to knock the gun out of the man's hand," Marquardt told the police. "Before he had more than reached for him the bandit shot twice and I think he must have killed Dickey at the first shot. Anyway, I wasn't able to tell, because he locked me up right away in the clothes closet."

The train stopped at Glencoe and after it had started again the conductor, R. M. Dilzer, went forward to see that all was well. He found the door to the baggage coach locked. He pounded on it.

Locks Up Conductor
The bandit meanwhile had locked up the baggage man in the closet and returned to the rear end of the car. He stood behind the door as he opened it to admit the conductor and the moment Dilzer was inside, slammed and locked the door again and forced the conductor to join the baggage man.

Neither of his prisoners saw him again. The train stops on signal at Winnetka and some one pulled the signal cord for such a stop.

The robber was seen to get off the train at Winnetka. He jumped into a taxi and ordered the driver to take him to Evanston where he got in a waiting Willys-Knight car and ordered the taxi driver to "beat it."

One of the robber's guns was found later in the taxi.

"We can give credit and help stabilize business throughout the world because of our large financial resources. Good wages, plenty of work, good prices for farm products, all start us off in the new year on a foundation of security and good will. The experience of the near past ought to guard us against over-enthusiasm, speculation and inflation. I see no reason why prosperity should not remain with us for a long time."

LAKE FOREST MAN KILLED ON RAILROAD

Father of Joseph Peddle of This City Meets Death Friday; Funeral Monday

Joseph Peddle, well known employe in the Highland Park Fuel company's office for years, was summoned last Friday by the news that his father, William Peddle of Lake Forest, had been accidentally killed there on a railway crossing. Mr. Peddle, who is 58 years old, was on his way from the home of a daughter to take a local car at the Noble avenue station.

An express car, which does not stop there, was approaching, and it is supposed Mr. Peddle mistook it for the local. He hurried to cross the tracks and was struck by the express and killed. An inquest was held Saturday, the jury returning an open verdict. Mr. Peddle is survived by eight children. His wife died about 10 years ago. The funeral was held at St. Mary's church, Lake Forest, on Monday morning. Joseph Peddle's many friends here extend deep sympathy to him and his brothers and sisters in their bereavement.
