

Trumpeter swans and whooping cranes have been completely exempt ed from the migratory birds which may be taken under Federal permits for scientific purposes. By action of the Acting Secretary of Agriculture on Nov. 12, 1924, approving a recvey, trumpeter swans were included with whooping cranes, which were similarly protected by the department in 1922.
